North Carolina Homes in Vir-

ginia During the War.

LEACHBURG, Johnston Co., Oct. 14.

I desire to state some things which

fell under my observation during the

late war which are facts, belonging to

the history of our state, and which

should be published in justice to her

record, and especially as due to her fa-

vorite son, Governor Z. B. Vance,

through whose instrumentality the deeds

about to be mentioned were brought

about. What Gov. Vance did for his

state here at home during those perilous

times is well enough known, and fully

engraved upon the hearts of his people.

I desire to show what provision he

made for North Carolina soldiers sta-

tioned in, and passing through Virginia.

Early after his first inauguration as

governor in the fall of 1862, he estab-

lished in Richmond, Va., a depot, a re-

lief association and a wayside home, for

the benefit of his soldiers stationed in

Virginia and for the citizens too of

North Carolina, who might have busi-

ness there, in visiting their friends and

relatives in the army, and especially for

the North Carolina sick and wounded in

Richmond and Virginia hospitals.

At this wayside home and depot, the

North Carolina soldier was received,

sheltered and fed by North Carolina men

--a great consolation within itself to

him--in a foreign land to be at home,

to feel at home, where he could freely

ask and in kindness receive any infor-

mation he might desire, where his goods,

boxes, &c., could be safely taken care of,

transportation procured and the way

pointed out wherein he might want to

go. Thousands of her soldiers received

these accommodations; and her citizens

too while passing through Richmond in

search of their army friends, or looking

after their sick and wounded, could

always get assistance, as a register of the

North Carolina sick and wounded (espe-

cially after the battles) was kept and

consequently information as to their

whereabouts could in most cases be

given, also a list of the different regi-

ments, brigades, &c., was always at

hand and generally their localities known

or approximated.

There too, were in store always sup-

plies for her sick and wounded. Pants,

drawers, shirts and socks were dis-

tributed in great quantities to them;

wines, cordials and all kinds of liquors for

hospital purposes were always on hand

and promptly distributed among North

Carolina hospitals on requisitions of the

surgeons in charge. Large supplies too

of bacon and other provisions were sent

there and used for the relief of her sol-

diers, her sick and wounded. Most of

our sister southern states had depots or

associations of some kind; but North

Carolina far excelled any of them

through the energy and patriotism of

her governor. The above is but a slight

outline of the work which Governor

Vance instituted and kept up to the

close of the war, showing how his great

heart went out of his own state looking
