REPUBLICANS PUBLICLY RENOUNCING RADICALISM.

[Special dispatch to the Sentinel.] GREENSBORO, N. C., Oct. 31, 1876. Grand rally at Liberty, Randolph county, yesterday. Governor Vance addressed one thousand people. A number of republicans publicly renounced radicalism. The people are awake and promise a rousing majority for Vance and reform.

WORTHY DEEDS OF NOBLE GENTLEMEN. [From the Hillsboro Recorder.] James Morris, who has been confined to his bed for several weeks, and wholly unable to attend to his farm affairs, there being no one to take his place, was visited last week by his brother grangers of the neighborhood, who brought with them a full supply of seed wheat, and in one day put in his fall crop in workmanlike order. Finding several bushels of wheat left over, they left it for the use of his family. This is the genuine spirit of the brotherhood.

Another instance of kindness deserves to be recorded. Mr. Morris sent for a colored neighbor to come and cut up and stow away a supply of wood—a good day's work. This was done cheerfully, and when at night when Mr. Morris offered to pay for the work the kind-hearted colored man refused all compensation.

The Attorney-General of Florida charges very heavy defalcations against the republican officials of that state. John W. Butler, the sheriff of Santa Rosa, has defaulted to the state for \$18,722.25, beside what he has stolen from the county treasury and school fund. A. P. Wheeler, collector of Escambia, is behind \$18,402.58. A. B. Minter, sheriff and collector of Leon, died a defaulter for \$27,000. Warren S. Bush, collector of Columbia, died, having stolen \$23,841.14. James D. Tammahill, collector of St. Johns, has embezzled \$2,507.15; John J. Month, of Duval, \$5,750.65; George W. Allen, of Suwanee, \$6,220.65; A. W. Leonard, of Orange, \$5,340.72. From the school fund in these counties has been stolen \$11,987. Finally, the republican candidate for Lieutenant-Governor, Daniel Montgomery, was a defaulter for \$9,739.67 on the 6th day of the Madison court-house burned, with his books and vouchers, and the state and county officers had to take his own statement in the "settlement." He brought the state in his debt!
