This order centains, in my opinion, so much that is not only revolutionary, but subversive of the very rudiments of our law, and especially wherein he invokes the "higher law" to clothe his deputies with such an extraordinary immunity. I desire to obtain your opinion in regard to the same for the benefit of the public.

Sin: We have received yours of this day, calling our attention to an order issued by J. B. Hill, Esq., U. S. Marshal, and published in the Daily Constitution of to-day, asking our opinion upon the same for the use of the public.

The question saked involves the highest constitutional rights of freemen, and we will answer it only in that light. We know of no such freedom from arrest secured to any United States officer, while holding an office under the Federal government, as that claimed in the following paragraph:

"No deputy marshal or supervisor is subject to arrest by any state authority while on duty, and any attempt to make such arrest must be ignered and resist-

such arrest must be ignored, and resist-

If a Federal officer could, for a day even, panoplise its incumbent, he could be armed forever, during his official term, against all arrests, when so shielded by his impenetrable official armor.

TO THE PUBLIC:-The publication of Mr. J. B. Hill. above referred to, presented to my mind the encouragement of such startling law-lessness (doubtless undesigned,) that I at once addressed to Hens. William H. Battle and B. F. Moore the above letter and received their reply, which I sub-mitted to Hon. M. W. Ransom and to members of the Baleigh bar, now in the

city.

The correspondence needs no explanation. The distinguished, able and upright jurists and patriots, who thus premptly complied with my request, have given the country their opinion,

promptly complied with my request, have given the country their opinion, which is concurred in by other members of the profession.

I have confidence, entire confidence, that their opinion is right. All men with any respect for law can have but one sentiment in regard to Mr. Hill's publication—that it is not only dangerous, but destructive of every principle of free elections. No such power has heretofore been assumed in this country. He proposes to substitute his will, and the will of his deputies, for the lawful authority of the state of North Carolins. I feel it to be my duty, as well as that of every lover of his country; to protest against this shameless usurpation, and to advise my countrymen not to be intimidated from an honest and fearless discharge of their duties whether done under show of authority or otherwise.

All illegal orders are void, and no man is expected, or ought to obey them. Yet, I advise and urge you te exercise supreme moderation on the day of election; to observe the laws of the hand, and to violate no man's rights. But I also urge you to maintain with the firmness of men your own rights and to discharge your duties as freemen. De nothing

urge you to maintain with the firmness of men your own rights and to discharge your duties as freemen. De nothing that can possibly excuse unnecessary and illegal interference, but do not permit lawless and corrupt partisans to obstruct you in the free exercise of your rights and duties. Use forbearance and exert every moral influence to prevent any improper conduct on the part of the deputies and supervisors but de not suffer them to subvert the election of the people and drown the voices of North Carolina. For remember, that these elections are held under the laws of our state, and her officers should maintain the peace, enforce her laws and not permit the people to be divested of their rights, and with the election of state offices, I again remind you that these Federal officers have not even a pretence to interfere.

And in this connection, I appeal to our friends in all parts of the state, on the day of election to close all places of business that they, and their employees, may devote that day to their country and aid in inaugurating a reign of law, of reform and reconciliation for the people of this afflicted and unhappy country.

Citizens of South Carolina Taken from their Beds by United States Troops. [Special despatch to the New York World.] AIREN, S. C., October 31st. - A United States Marshal, accompanied by Lieutenant Goodwin and a detachment of troops, made a midnight raid and brought in thirteen white citizens ac-cused of participating in the Ellenton massagre. Taking citizens from their beds was a wanton outrage, as all could beds was a wanton outrage, as all could have been found without trouble at any time, and many of them had notified the authorities that they were ready to report whenever requested. The jail here is filled with citizens arrested on the most filmsy pretexts. On the other hand, six negroes arrested on the confession of one of their own number for tearing up a retiroud track and wreck. fession of one of their own number for tearing up a mitroad track and wrecking a train and cutting telegraph wires during the same riot, were released on their own recognizance by republican state officials, and have not been rearrested by United States authorities. United States District-Attorney Corbin continues to grind his outrage-mill. The ex-parts statements of negro without the statement of negro without the statement of negro without the statement of negro with the statemen pesses are mifted for horrors and furnished to correspondents of northern republican papers as facts, thus throwing all the blame on the whites. The district-attorney has found it convenient not to examine a single white witness, while accepting and permitting to be published for facts statements of negroes whom whites accuse of originating riot, and whose stories they would flatly contradict if permitted to testify.
