

LOCAL MATTERS.

In view of Tilden's election only fifteen applications for office of postmaster have been made out in a neighboring village.

Touree writes to the New York Tribune, he thinks North Carolina will go republican by three thousand majority.

As a sign of general rejoicing a nurse was wheeling a baby carriage along the street yesterday and the child was crying at every foot of the way, "Hurrah for Vance."

The last news from Louisiana was that four hundred old democrats had been refused to register but they set up a box of their own and the last heard they were voting in it.

Local Dot. There was a jubilee among the boys last night over the good news for Tilden from Florida and South Carolina. The streets were noisy with cannon crackers and the air alive with rockets and other fireworks.

Shot at Greensboro. The Richmond Dispatch says information was received in that city Wednesday that Edward Scott, a democrat, was shot in the groin by J. Barney Greeter, a republican. Scott is probably mortally wounded. The row grew out of a discussion of elections.

The Governor Invited. In the midst of political hubbub Gov. Brogden received an invitation yesterday to take dinner at six o'clock in Philadelphia and go out to-day at Fairmount Park and witness the closing exercises of the centennial. The governor, in view of the election of Vance, having no appetite for a dinner, acknowledged the receipt of the invitation, but regretted he could not be present.

Signs in the North. John M. Dorrance representing here the New York house of Marchison & Co., received a dispatch from his house yesterday morning saying "Market firm; Tilden positively elected." In the evening he received a telegram reading "Market wild and off a half. Intense excitement prevails in the city. Tilden will probably be counted out." The market the day before on the strength of Tilden's election had advanced a cent to a cent and a half.

Elias Powell. This red-handed murderer was to be hanged between six and seven o'clock this morning, at which time his fourth respite would expire. Powell was one of the two negro murderers who waylaid and slew leader Cobes, a merchant at Whitakers, in the last part of December, 1874. The sentence of his comrade in crime, John Williams, was commuted to imprisonment for life. Whether Gov. Brogden will similarly interfere to save Powell's neck from the gallows we have not learned.

The Friends meeting in Guilford. The annual meeting of the quakers in Guilford county adjourned yesterday. The meeting this year was not so well attended as the last meeting. Last Sunday there were about 1500 present at the preaching at New Garden. Rev. Mr. Berkwait from England preached in the morning and Rev. Luke Woodard from Indiana preached in the evening. At the same time a large meeting was going on out doors where Isaac Cox and others preached. As to the business of the meeting very favorable reports on the missionary and the Sabbath school were read, and Dr. Garner gave in his report about the Cherokee Indians, showing that many of them are now being educated and they are living an industrious and industrious life. Reports on temperance were also read. A Tennessee yearly meeting was also established granting the friends in that State the privilege of holding annual meetings like the one at New Garden.

STOKES. Greensboro, Nov. 9.—Stokes reports democratic gain of 200. Merrimon's majority was 75 in 1872.

WILKES. Horten (dem.) is elected to the house in Wilkes, and Harris is defeated by Red Fox Bryant by 26 votes. Two democratic commissioners elected. Settle carries the county by 206.

ASHB. Ashe goes democratic from 209 to 300.

GUILFORD. Greensboro, Nov. 9.—Official returns for Guilford give Vance 287 majority. Merrimon's majority in 1872 was 18; a gain of 269. Majority for ratification 235. Seales beats Boyd in Guilford for congress 488. Junius J. Seales beats Helton 402 for the senate, and Holt beats Vincent 421. Swain beats Causey 437 for the house, and Staples beats Murrow 389.

RUTHERFORD. Rutherfordton, Nov. 8.—With two townships to hear from the following is the estimated result: Majority for Tilden 230, for Vance 180, for Robert Vance 230. In the senate, Justice, democrat 250, Beas in the house 235, and ratification 235. Caldwell carried Rutherford by 286 majority.

SURRY. Morganton, Nov. 8.—Official vote not in, but enough is known to assure a majority for Vance of 850 to 600. Tilden probably 50 ahead of Vance. Amendments run far ahead of our ticket. Wilson elected to the house by a very large majority. Merrimon's majority in 1872 was 169.

CHATHAM. Pittsboro, Nov. 8.—Obatham has given 500 more votes than ever before polled. Tilden 2,141, Hayes 1,865, Vance 2,083, Settle 1,901, Davis 2,141, Young 1,805, Ratification 2,114. Rejection 1,846. County ticket 300 majority.

Western Union Bulletin.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 9.—19 counties, all official except 4, give democrats a majority of 23 613. 11 counties, from trustworthy reports, some official, give a republican majority of 14, 159. The only two remaining counties, Charleston and Carlton, where before the election the republicans claimed respectively 6,000 and 5,000 majority. If the result confirms their anticipation Hampton's net majorities would be 2,944, and Tilden's majority will be 10 or 15 per cent. less. The city is in a condition of feverish excitement to-day.

VIRGINIA CITY, Nov. 9.—From the best information obtainable, Nevada gives a republican majority of about 1,000.

SAN FRANCISCO Nov. 9.—No actual figures can be given for Oregon, but the chairman of the republican state committee telegraphs that the state is sure for Hayes and Wheeler by 1,000 majority.

LAKE CITY, Fla., Nov. 9.—A steamboat is expected at Ft. Matka this afternoon bringing returns from upper St. Johns river counties. Both parties still claim the state and nothing is positively known as to the result.

LATER—21 counties give 1,711 republican majority, 18 counties not heard from, but estimates based on the election of 1874, give a democratic gain of 1,966 which will make the state democratic by 235.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—The Express in an extra says: It has no reason to change the fact that a majority of the electoral votes are for Tilden and Hendricks. This, it says is the voice of the people and nothing can change it but enormous frauds of returning boards, as was done in Louisiana in 1874.

SAVANNAH, November 9.—2 a. m.—Communication is cut off from Florida. The Middle and West Florida Railroad and telegraph is injured by lightning. A large number of voters were on the train.

LAKE CITY, Fla., November 9.—Returns received up to 10:30 this morning show democratic gains, but leave the state in doubt. It is thought that the actual count will be necessary to determine the result. The democrats estimate their majority at 2,500, and the republicans theirs at 1,500.

NEW ORLEANS, November 9.—10:30 a. m.—The democrats claim the state by 15,000. The estimates are made from returns already received. The republicans claim that when the river parishes are heard from they will have 10,000 majority. The returning board decides the election in Louisiana. Despatches from Florida indicate a democratic majority of 1,200 in that state.

NEW YORK, November 9.—The World has the three following specials: MILWAUKEE, November 8.—Nothing but the official canvass can settle Wisconsin. Both sides claim it by about 1,000 majority.

CHICAGO, November 8.—Illinois shows a democratic gain in forty counties of 37,000. The state is surely democratic.

CARSON, Nevada, November 7.—Indications are that the state has gone democratic by 1,000 majority.

RICHMOND, November 9.—One hundred and eighty-four electoral votes are considered certain for Tilden, the balance is confidently claimed by republicans, who claim Florida, South Carolina and Louisiana. The Pacific states have in all probably gone republican. Governor Hayes' private secretary is sending out telegrams claiming a majority of one in the electoral college. The contest is very close and reliable information comes in slowly.

YANKTON, D. T., Nov. 9.—Election returns come in slowly, but indicate a larger republican majority than ever given before. Yankton county gives a total vote of 1,400, giving Kidder, republican, for delegate, over Spink, democrat, a majority of 101. All the county republican ticket is elected except one. Outside counties give Kidder a large majority, which will probably reach 8,000.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 9.—Complete returns from the third congressional district give it to Metcalf, republican, by 31 majority. The democrats claim the sixth district for Morgan by 700 majority. This district was previously reported as probably for Haven, republican. The republicans carry their county ticket in this county, except for probate judge and public administrators. Assistant prosecuting attorney Emanuel Thomas leads his ticket for sheriff by 3,500 over ex-mayor Brown, and the remainder of the republican candidates have an average majority of 1,500.

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—The only additional congressional news is that Tipton, republican, has carried the 18th district, making the fourth republican gain in the state. Sparks, democrat, has carried the 16th district by a good majority. There is no reasonable foundation for the claim that the democrats have carried Illinois. A careful comparison of returns received with the highest democratic vote cast in 1872 indicates 20,000 republican majority. Gains of republicans in congressional

districts exactly reverse the present political character of the Illinois delegation. Two of these gains have been made in Egypt, a democratic stronghold, and the republicans have gained some members of the legislature also from that section, which would be an impossibility if the democrats carried the state of the aggregate vote registered, which shows an erroneous increase over 1872. The democrats got a greater representation than the republicans in ratio apparently but 60 to 40.

NEW YORK, November 9.—The Commercial Advertiser says that the republicans at their headquarters in the Fifth Avenue Hotel are still confident that Hayes has carried Florida, which is all that is required to secure Hayes' election. Despatches were received from various points in Florida this morning confirming the claim made that the republicans had carried that state. The democrats are quite as confident that Tilden has carried the state. North Carolina is still in doubt, although it is claimed by Tilden. Senator Mitchell telegraphs from Oregon that the state is sure for Hayes. The result will not be satisfactorily settled until North Carolina and Florida are officially heard from. A dispatch was received in this city at noon to-day from Governor Sterns of Florida, announcing that that state has given 2,000 majority for Hayes. Secretary Chandler received despatches from the southern and Pacific states, which leave no doubt in his mind of the election of Hayes. Sheriff Jones of Jacksonville, Fla., telegraphs that the state is undoubtedly republican.

Mr. Matier, the chairman of the republican state committee, sends a telegram from Tallahassee claiming the state for the republicans by 2,000 majority. Secretary Chandler answers all inquiries by stating that the election of Governor Hayes is considered beyond doubt. Senators Borie and Sargeant of California, have telegraphed that that state is republican by a large majority. Senator Jones of Nevada says that the state elects their republican ticket. From Louisiana Attorney General Elliott telegraphs that the state is republican by 10,000 majority.

SAN FRANCISCO, November 9.—A dispatch from Virginia City this morning says that Nevada will give 1,000 majority for the republicans. Scattering returns from that state also indicate that result. Returns are coming in very slowly. In California, returns thus far received give Hayes 5,400 majority, which additional returns are not likely to vary. For Congress, Davis and Page (republicans) are certainly elected, and Pacheco (republican) is thought to be elected in the southern district, as he has been running considerably ahead of his ticket in the fourth district. The contest is very close.

WASHINGTON, November 9.—The Western Union bulletins give Florida to the democrats by 1,500 majority. The Tribune, summing up the Congressional returns, says the democrats will have half their present majority.

LAKE CITY, Fla., November 9, 1:45 p. m.—Twenty-one counties in Florida give 1711 republican majority; eighteen counties are not heard from, but estimates, based on the election of 1874, give a democratic majority of 1,966, which will make the state democratic by 255.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., November 9.—Enough returns show at least 35,000 majority for Tilden, and an unbroken delegation of democratic Congressmen. Shelley, democrat, in the fourth district, has a handsome majority. Bopier and Haralson, negroes, divide the republican vote between them. This makes a gain of two democratic congressmen.

SAVANNAH, Ga., November 9.—There is nothing to hear from Florida; nothing is expected until the arrival of the St. John's river steamer at Palatka.

NEW YORK, November 9.—The Western Union Telegraph Company received the following dispatch, dated Lake City, November 9, 5 p. m.: Further returns from 21 counties in Florida make a republican majority of 1,246, with 18 counties to be heard from, 16 of which democratic majority in 1874 of 1,966; at this rate the democratic majority in the state will be about 1,500.

CHARLESTON, November 9.—Complete returns from Colleton, and partial returns from Charleston county indicate that Hampton has carried South Carolina by from 1,700 to 1,900 majority. The democrats gain seven senators and thirty-four representatives, giving them a sure majority of 63 on a joint ballot, securing a United States senator in the place of Robertson. The vote for president is still closer. The democratic committee are confident of a small majority for Tilden.

CHICAGO, November 9.—The republicans gain five congressmen in Illinois, and the democrats elect the following: Harrison in the second, Hangan in the tenth, Knapp in the eleventh, Springer in the twelfth, Eden in the fifteenth, Morrison in the seventeenth, Townsend in the nineteenth, and possibly Sparks in the sixteenth.

SELMA, Ala., November 9.—Shelley, democrat, is elected to congress by 177 majority, beating Haralson, colored, the present member.

WASHINGTON, November 9.—The best figures give the democrats twenty-seven majority in the next house. This estimate concedes to the republicans every reasonably doubtful district.

NEW YORK, November 9.—The following has been received from the republican headquarters at the Fifth Avenue Hotel: Governor Kellogg telegraphs as follows: The returns are even better than were expected; as easy so far as Louisiana is concerned.

NEW YORK Nov. 9.—The Western Union Telegraph Company furnishes the following bulletins: Lake City, Florida 9:30 p. m. Key West Monroe Co, gives Tilden 987, Hayes 988, Republican majority one; Florida honestly estimated by democrats, gives 1720 majority at lowest possible figures. No boat yet.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 8.—The election of Slinger, democrat, to congress is claimed by 51 majority.

HARTFORD, Ct., Nov. 9.—The full vote of Connecticut for president is: Tilden, 61,918; Hayes, 38,829; Cooper, 852; Smith, 247.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9.—Returns from the interior have been very meagre during the day, and the election of congressmen in the third and fourth districts is not yet decided. George C. Gorham received a dispatch from Oregon this evening, signed by Senator Mitchell and congressman elect Williams, stating that Senator Kelly concedes the state republican by 800 majority.

A Virginia City dispatch says Hayes' majority is certainly not less than 1,100. The republican congressmen and judge of the supreme court are elected by perhaps 1,000.

RICHMOND, Nov. 9.—Hinton, democrat, is probably elected, making the Virginia delegation solid.

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 9.—Senator Jones of Nevada, is here, and thinks Nevada will go democratic.

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 9.—A private telegram just received here from L. A. Wiltze, democratic candidate for lieutenant governor in Louisiana, says: "Louisiana has gone democratic by 12,000."

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—The national republican committee publishes the following: Gov. Stearns, of Florida, telegraphs to-day from Tallahassee as follows: There is no doubt of our majority in this state if we can secure an honest canvass. The indications are that violence is to be freely resorted to, so as to prevent any returns from remote points in the interior.

A special train from Tallahassee last night for the Chattahoochee to collect returns from the western counties was kulkuxed a few miles west of here and the train thrown from the track which was torn up and blockaded in several places.

Playing Them Up With Music. Harsett county was canvassed by Troy with a band of music from Fayetteville. They travelled in a large four-horse wagon with flags, twelve performers and the driver. They made the hilltops and valleys ring with the music, stopping at every farm house on the way and playing the laborers leaning on the fences entranced, and then the shout went up, "Rally, boys, rally, for Tilden and Vance; they are bound to be elected, Tilden and Vance." The result was an increase over the Merrimon vote in that county of 200. Captain Phillips, of Fayetteville, was the leader of the band and a democratic negro from Fayetteville was the driver of the wagon. At night they built up large fires, and the people stocked from miles around and felt so very happy when the band began to play that they didn't go to bed at all.
