THE LAW AND LOUISIANA: SENATOR BAYARD DEGLINES EX-TRA-LEGAL MEDDLING WITH THE LAW.

Our Rights and Victory Secure With Time and Patience-Seasonable Words of Wisdom.

[New York World.]

Senator Bayard, who was in town yea-terday at the New York hotel, was waited on by a reporter of The World, with whom he spoke freely, as follows, about the situation in Louisiana:

Reporter—Senator Bayard, I have called from The World to ask if you are going to New Orleans to be present at the session of the Leuisians Beturning Board?

Senator Bayard—Certainly not. Sug-gestions have been made from very re-spectable quarters that it would be well for me to form one of a select corps of observation upon the action of the Louis-iana Returning Board, but as I am in the habit of acting upon what I believe to be lawful warrant, and see no such warrant in this case, I cannot conceive in what in this case, I cannot conceive in what capacity I could be expected to act in furtherance of an honest return of the Leuisiana vote. What status a citizen of Delaware, whether he happened or not to be a member of the senate or the house, or to hold any other office under his own state or the United States, could occupy before a board of Louisiana state officials, is more than I can discover.

R.—You do not they approve. I pre-

R—You do not then approve, I presume, of the president's action in inviting certain gentlemen of other states to visit Louisiana for this purpose?

Senator B.—The action of the president action of the president action.

Senator B.—The action of the presi-dent, in my judgment, is not only as much without authority as the sugges-tions of my party friends made to me, but it seems to me to be still more im-proper than these suggestions, because, being stade by the president, it implies an official power to interfere in matters which ought to be and are strictly inde-pendent of him and of his action. In my opinion it only makes the case worse my opinion it only makes the case worse when a federal official volunteers by virtue of his office to create agents not only unknown to the law, but in violation of unknown to the law, but in violation of the law, because they are to assume functions which are reposed in other hands by the law. No matter what may be the issue of the returns or the conduct of the Returning Board, either set of such delegates would be totally without power to arrest the wrong in fieri or to remedy it when accomplished. Neither the prevention nor the cure lies with them nor with the president, but here them nor with the president, but both do exist elsewhere, ample and well-de-

fined. R.-Then. nize any value whatever in the action of such extra-legal delegates, even if the president had selected for the mission the best known and most judicial men in the country, and these had accepted the

mission? Senator B.—The partisan or non-par-tisan character of the president's selec-tions does not touch the question of his want of authority or theirs to make in-quisition into Louisiana elections. Had the persons named by the president been, what they are not, unbiased and disinterested witnesses of an important historical event, their testimony might have gone far to satisfy public opini in regard to matters passing under their personal observation. But the president by omitting to name even one of those who have not supported his administra-tion has put the idea of impartiality out

of the question.

R.—Do you think, senator, that the democratic party should take any action

as matters now stand?
Senator B.—I hate the very name of party in connection with such an emergency as now apparently confronts the American people. Whether successfully or not, I should ask or seek nothing to-day from any man, either as a democrat or as a republican, but simply try to control him by a sense of his duty as a citizen to the constitution and laws of his country. I have given my adhesion to the democratic party because I believe to the democratic party because I believe it to be the party of law and order, and I believe to-day that its success is firmly intrenched in both, and that it only needs that its candidates and its members should stand by the law as it is written in letter and its members and its members and its members should stand by the law as it is written, in letter and in spirit, in order written, in letter and in spirit, in order to have the full consummation of its victory in the results of the presidential election of Tuesday last. Therefore it is that I strenuously deprecate any resort, no matter how well intentioned, to irregular methods for controlling legal results. To apply these remarks to the case in point. Whether in dealing with Louisiana South Carolina or Flerida. Louisiana, South Carolina or Flerida what I mean to say is this: The elections in these states have been held; the votes have been cast, the ballots are, or ought have been cast, the ballots are, or ought to be, in existence, and they disclose, or did disclose, a majority on one side or on the other. Which way these majori-ties, or any of them, are is a question of fact, which is or ought to be capable of distinct and positive proof if the laws have not been violated. It is by that fact that the American people must stand and not by any false and counter-feit presentment of that fact, whether prepared by the frank of an official hand prepared by the fraud of an official hand or not. Never was there an occusion mere gravely calling for an utter absence of anything like personal irritation or party heat; but, at the same time, never was there an occasion demanding more deliberate and grave determination to insist upon the very truth and right of this question, under the suthority of the law and of the law alone. Our path will then be plainly marked out, for us, and we can and will tread it with an unfal-

tering step. Philadelphia Times: This is not the first occasion that the great importance of one vote has been exemplified in this country, but it should be the prayer of every freeman, that it may be the last, as far as the presidency is involved. PRESS DOTS ON THE ELECTIONS.

Ballots, bayonets and builtins now occupy public attention; but patience is most needed.

Baltimore Gazette: If by any reason the choice of the president by the electoral college shoul fail, the election will be thrown into the present house of representatives. There the vote would be by states, and the democrats would vote twenty-three states, the republicans thirteen.

New York Sun: This, then, is the sum of the case. There are three disputed states. To declare Hayes elected he must have the votes of them all, but Tilden is elected by the vote of any one of them. This readers the problem of Gould and Chandler difficult. If but one state were in dispute, their success would be more practicable; but to carry all three through fraud, is a much more

The Baltimore Gazette says: Tilden requires only one vote from the contestrequires only one vote from the contest-ed states; Hayes all. If by obtaining one or even two by counting out the democratic majority, a majerity could be figured out for Hayes, the danger would be very great. But to steal the electoral votes of three states is too large an un-dertaking for even such adroit practi-tioners as the radical managers.

The radical and infamous Philadelphia Bulletin says: If Governor Hayes has just secured one more electoral vote than his opponent, the fact is an almost certain promise of trouble in the early future. When the votes are counted in the presence of the two houses of con-gress, the rebel house of representatives will surely make an effort to throw out one or more of the southern states that have voted for Hayes upon the ground of the perpetration of frauds.

The view which the New York World takes of the situation is expressed in a paragraph: The governor of Louisiana is a creation of Grantism and the carpet-baggers. He bears no such relation to Louisiana as does a northern governor. Louisiana as does a northern governor, democratic or republican, to a northern state. A word from his creators, and justice re-enters in that state upon its glorious course. Will they give the word? If they do not give the word, over them and theirs what a tremendous responsibility impends!
