### KILPATRICK. THE CHAMPION LIAR OF THE CENTENNIAL

CAMPAIGN.

HIS EPISTOLARY BATCH OF WHOPPING AND UNMITI-GATED LIES IN REGARD TO NORTH CAROLINA. HER PEOPLE AND

RALEIGH, N. C., Nov. 9, 1876. To the Editor of the New York Times:

"North Carolina has gone overwhelmingly democratic." I suppose this statement is almost as familiar to you new as it has become to me within the past two days. I admit that this state is not to be counted as in favor of the republican nominees, but believe that the democratic candidates may not ultimately have that large majority of the votes which is now claimed for them by their supporters. Counties in the north-west, north-east, and south are yet to be heard from, and their returns will, it is hoped, greatly diminish the advantage of our opponents. Yet, I shall not be sur-prised if the majority claimed be in-creased instead of diminished. I can see no reason why it should not be mul-tiplied fivefold, if the elections were conducted in the counties whose returns are not yet in, as they were in the other parts of the state. What I saw on Tuesday last, and what I have heard since, horrify me; and I know the recital of the facts must appall every true American citizen. Fraud, treachery, and intimi-dation are the means by which this state has been carried against the republican party, and these instruments were used party, and these instruments were used by men of resolute will, who are not in-cumbered by a particle of conscience. The republicans of North Carolina have never been well organized, else I might not now have such a story of shame to detail. They have not many leaders who, in intelligence, foresight, and resolute will, can compete with the men who are at the head of the democracy. They were deceived by the "still bust" policy of their opponents, so that while the latter were preparing for the election the latter were preparing for the election of last Tuesday, they were idle. The result is known. When they went to the polls on election day they found those places in the possession of the democrately, who were well armed and determined carried the country, that of 1860, just after Linable. of last Tuesday, they were idle. The result is known. When they went to the to resist every endeavor to expel them. Even in thoroughly republican counties

was this plan of seizing the polls carried into effect by the democrats. So thorough were their methods and organization, the republicans could do nothing. The hypocrisy of the Tildenites was such that it almost surpasses belief, and it is certain that if any violent at-tempt to dislodge them had been made, the apparent blame of causing bloodshed would have fallen upon the republicans. They desired, they said, to have a fair election, and would protect every citizen in his right to vote. The republicans accepted their assurances, for two reasons—they could not on the instant cope with such thoroughly organized bands, and they did not at first penetrate the hypocrisy of their opponents. Well, the rebels—for such they are in spirit—kept guard over the polls. They admitted voters one by one, and whenever a republican approached the ballet-boxes challenged and harassed him with ques tions. In this way they consumed time, and, in every precinct so far heard from, when the sun went down it was found that numbers of republicans had been challenged and talked out of their votes, As for themselves, the Tilden and Vance

harass their opponents; and the indica-tions are that they also voted often. Let me here state a fact which indicates the perpetration of shameless frauds by the successful party in this state. On the very night of the election, within two hours after the polls had been c'osed, apparently official reports were received at Raleigh that certain re-mote democratic districts had given Tilden and Vance, and the others on their tickets, large majorities, and also stating the figures of those majorities. Honest reports could not have reached here from those districts in much less time than two days. To-day the reports of Tues-day night have been verified (?) by dispatches from the districts in question. New, what do these facts indicate, may, prove, except that the democratic committee of each county was directed to send in a certain majority agreed upon beforehand? One county has given a democratic majority of 1,400. Previous to this time that county has been repub-lican, and the majority for the demo-crate now announced is greater than the greatest number of votes ever before

polled. It must not now seem strange to year that no republican in this city would be astonished if the democratic majority in this state, when all the returns have come in, should run higher than it is now claimed. Our hope is, however, that the rebels did not rule affairs in the north-west, north-east, and southern counties, as they did elsewhere. Advanced to the entrance to the booth and asked permission to go in and act as a challenger. He was met by five armed men, who styled themselves policemen, and who percemptorily refused to allow him to enter as a challenger. He then demanded to be permitted to vote. This permission was granted him. He en-tered the polling-place, voted, and theu refused to leave. After considerable bluster the rebels determined to permit him to remain. He states that every negro that entered the polling-place was challenged and time was lost in dis-cussing every case. Republican ballots were snatched from the hands of the colored men by the self-constituted policemen, and democratic tickets were given them in exchange; and long before the sun went down, the democrats de-clared that the time for closing the poll had arrived. Over one hundred negroes were then waiting to vote, and, if the poll was closed, would have been cheat-ed of their rights. This overcame the arguments of the democrats and the voting went on; yet, when the polls did close, it was found that twenty seven negroes had been disfranchised by the persistent challenging of the voters in advance of challenging of the voters in advance of them, which kept them in line until after sundown. There are 1,800 voting precincts in North Carolina New, if we assume, as we may fairly, that at least ten voters have been disfranchised in each district by the tactics of the democrats, we find that in the entire state between thirty and forty thousand re-publicans have been deprived of their right to vote. And thus has North Carc-tine been carried by the Associate and lost to the republicans. Thus has the old North State again been captured by after Lincoln's election; and the white rebels of North Carolina stand ready today to respond to any call that may be made upon them, for whatever treasonable purpose.
