NEWS OBSERVATIONS.

Fencing is all the go in Paris just now, for ladies as well as men. Governor Cleveland was two score and six years of age on Sunday last.

The British have sent a cruiser to Madagascar and will send another immediately to look after the first.

Miss Jennie Chamberlain, the American beauty, is not to return to this country soon, as her mother has taken a mansion in Belgravia for the London season.

The steamship Red Sea, drawing twenty-four feet of water and having a cargo equivalent to 11,167 bales of cotton, passed through the jetties nicely the other day.

A public highway law has been put in force in Florida. Under it every citizen is compelled to perform the same duty, six years' work in each year, and a failure to perform the labor or pay the equivalent in cash, will be a misdemeanor punishable by fine and imprisonment.

The inter-State competitive drill at New Orleans, under the auspices of the Louisiana State National Guard, will begin on Thursday, May 17th, and close on the Saturday following.

BEYOND SEA.

QUEEN VICTORIA'S CONDITION IMPROVED. Twenty Duels at Vienna—The Troubles in Ireland.

LONDON, March 22.—The condition of Queen Victoria's limb, which was injured by her fall on the stairs at Windsor palace, Saturday last, continues most satisfactory.

LONDON, March 22.—A Central News correspondent at St. Petersburg says: "The Czar has received letters threatening him with death if he does not pardon the imprisoned nihilists."

VIENNA, March 22.—The recent demonstration of the reading club of the students here in memory of Wagner, has led to 20 duels among the students, the combatants being Germans on one side, Austrians on the other.

LONDON, March 22.—Cardinal Manning has issued an appeal asking for collections in aid of distressed people in Ireland.

DUBLIN, March 22.—The Freeman's Journal says that a number of inspectors on duty in Ireland have been drafted to London as extra detectives.

PARIS, March 22.—The Revision of the Constitution League has published its programme. It attacks the present constitution as framed in the interest of an oligarchy, and declares that reform or desirable government is impossible with two hostile legislative houses.

MANCHESTER, March 22.—The Guardian in its commercial article says there is but little change in the course of business. The market is steady, but in some cases there is a slight weakness.

TORONTO, ONT., March 22.—Mr. Dwight has received the following message from Col. DeWinton, secretary to the Marquis of Lorne: "It affords the Governor-General great pleasure to transmit the following authentic news concerning her Majesty the Queen: Her Majesty is suffering from the effects of a slight sprain of the knee, and will soon be well."

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 22.—Judge Lawrence, First Comptroller of the Treasury, to-day rendered a decision on the question submitted to him by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, as to whether the tax and tariff act of March 3d, 1883, either of itself or in connection with existing laws, operates as an appropriation of money necessary to pay claims which may be presented under its 4th section for a rebate of the tax on unbroken factory packages of tobacco, snuff, cheroots and cigarettes.

Election Cases in Louisiana.

NEW ORLEANS, March 22.—In the election fraud cases yesterday against Casper Glazer and Owen Short, commissioners of election of the 5th precinct of the 9th ward, Peter Graves, deputy clerk of the criminal district court, presented the poll-book of precinct number 5, of the 9th ward, parish of Orleans, wherein the district attorney charges that 65 names of persons appeared who had not voted.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—The Governor of Montana sent the following dispatch to the Postoffice Department to-day: "Vigilants at Greenhorn, Montana, have removed the Democratic postmaster by hanging. Government fuel must be scarce, as he was caught barn burning. The office is now vacant. The sureties have been notified to take charge of the office."

LYNCHBURG, VA., March 22.—Wm. Cooper, chief of the gang of counterfeiters in southwest Virginia, has been sentenced to 3 years in the penitentiary by Roanoke county Court. The gang has been operating extensively, but it is now broken up.

COLUMBUS, GA., March 22.—At 1 o'clock this morning the Fontaine cotton warehouse was destroyed by fire. It was owned by Abe Illyes and kept by Hatcher & Brannon. Thirty-four hundred bales of cotton, forty rolls of bagging, three hundred bundles of ties, twenty barrels of syrup and forty-one bales of domestic, besides other property on storage, were burned.

CHARLESTON, S. C., March 22.—United States Commissioner Geyer to-day commenced the preliminary hearing of the case against McFadden and others, managers of Wetherspoon precinct, in Clarendon county, charged with conspiracy to prevent qualified voters from casting their votes at the last general election.

WASHINGTON, March 19, 1883.—Blanks for the use of tobacco dealers having claim for rebate on tobacco, snuff and cigars, on hand May 1, in original stamped packages, will be ready for distribution in a few days to over 400,000 licensed tobaccoists.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 22.—The exchanges of 31 per cent. bonds into 3 per cent. will be suspended by the Treasury from March 31st to May 1st, and an adjustment of the interest on exchanges made thereafter.

NEW YORK, March 22.—The stock market opened firm and is 1 1/2 per cent. above the prices at yesterday's close, while St. Paul, Minneapolis and Manitoba opened 2 per cent. higher.
