Board of Aldermen.
The board held its monthly meeting last evening. The reports of all the officers and of all the standing committees were submitted. That of alderman Edwards, chairman of the street committee, was the most interesting. It gave a detailed statement of the cost of the Belgian block pavement on Fayetteville street. This work has been accepted, it stated, and found satisfactory in all respects. The cost was given, including the paving at the intersection of Hargett street, the curbing, &c. (The detailed statement will be published, giving the various items, &c.) Permission was granted Prof. Davis to illustrate on the streets his rapid system of computation. Authority was given the street committee to continue the paving of Fayetteville street with Belgian block down to Martin street, to begin June 1, by which time to ample supply of blocks and sand is to be secured, so that the work shall not be interrupted. An amendment to the ordinance was adopted in regard to official publications in the city newspapers. The chairman of the city cemetery committee was granted permission to repair the fence around that cemetery.

A Remarkably Excellent Performance.
Every one of the amateurs who took part in the presentation of the opera "Pocahontas," at Tucker hall last evening, has reason to be proud of a finished performance, which was at once a revelation and a surprise to a delighted and very large audience. The cast of characters was in all respects good, the stage business full of life, the costumes and accessories well arranged and the music very "taking." Miss Ella Mitchell, in the title role of "Pocahontas," made an impression which must have specially gratified her. Her fine voice had before been heard, but she had never had an opportunity to show her ability as an actress also. She is vivacious, sweet-voiced and graceful, and her encores were all deserved. Mr. Walton Busbee, as "Pocahontas," was forceful, and showed his accustomed merit as an actor. He filled the character most acceptably. Mr. William Anderson's tenor voice was musical, and his duet, as "Rawhutt," with "Pocahontas," was very fine. Mr. James N. Anderson, as "Dick," was literally brim-full of fun, and the audience "caught on" his cleverness from the first. He was heartily applauded. Mr. Sherwood Haywood was a dashing Capt. Smith. Mr. Howard Haywood sustained very well his character as a "medicine man," and Mr. Alex. McPeeters, Jr., was a most pronounced dupe. The choruses were tuneful, and the careful stage management of Messrs. Hart and Paul was pleasantly apparent. The music, by the Philharmonic orchestra of fifteen pieces, was sparkling, and Dr. Paul showed that he was fully able to swell the title of the "North Carolina Sullivan" and Mr. Charles B. Hart to hold that of the "Gilbert." At the conclusion of the performance both these gentlemen were called before the curtain. In a neat little speech Mr. Hart returned the thanks of the composers to the performers who had given so meritorious a presentation of the opera. He announced that the performance would be repeated next Monday evening.

Resolved: That these resolutions be presented to the supreme court by the chairman of this committee, with the request that the same be spread upon its minutes, and that a copy be sent by the secretary to the family of the deceased, and also to the city papers, with a request for the publication thereof.
