Among ever-greens are the hemlock and the white cedar, the hemlock standing at the head! for attractiveness in the fineness and density of its foliage, which can be secured admirably by a little care in clipping the branches; but patience must be had with this tree, as it is a slow grower, doing better after it has attained its size. Set out the trees early in the spring, before the buds push, with plenty of roots. selecting small, rather than large trees, as more roots in proportion to top can be secured, and the smaller will make the handsomest trees, and do it sooner. The tobacco market has been crowded of late, and the warehouses have been filled to their utmost c pacity. At times the quantity offered was greater then could be received, and good tobacco is



bacco trade. Another improvement promised at an early day is a large stone or brick storage warehouse, to be 100x300 feet in size, probably the largest in the State. This is to be built upon the R.
