If the prohibitionists succeed, therefore, the effect will be not only to close the bar rooms, but to prevent the sale of liquor in any quantity and prevent the hotels from furnishing spirituous or malt liquors, wines or cordials to their guests at any time.

There is a section of the Code (No. 3,110) which provides that "all wines made from grapes, blackberries, currants, gooseberries, raspberriess and strawberries, manufactured in this State from fruit raised in the State, may be sold in bottles corked or sealed up and not to be drunk on the premises, in any quantity, whether greater or less than one quart," &c., but as our correspondent does not touch upon the question which it involves we do not quote it
