AUGUSTA, Ga., July 9 .- The hands in the picker-room of the Augusta factory struck today for an advance of 10 per cent in wages, president Phinizy having replied to their demands that he could not grant the advance. That mill has lost in two years and a half nearly \$100,000, and it is impossible, without further loss to the stockholders, to increase the wages of the operators. He says; "To ask us at this time to ad-

vance wages, would be to ask to con tinue indefinitely, not merely the nonpayment of a dividend, but a process of consuming the permanent investment of the company; for we tell you sincerely that the earnings of the company






