NORTH CAROLINA NEWS. **SOME HAPPENINGS AS TOLD BY THE STATE PRESS.** At least a part of Charlotte's street railway will be finished by the latter part of October.

The democrats of McDowell held a primary election Friday, the first in the history of that part of the State. Neuse river and Little river at Goldsboro are very high; higher than in twenty years. The latter river rose six feet in twelve hours last Saturday.

The barn of Thomas Shaw, near Charlotte was burned Friday night. Presumably the fire was caused by rats. The loss was \$1,000.

The congregation of Front street M. E. church at Wilmington, through the kindness of their Jewish friends, are using the temple of Israel for a place of worship.

Wiley Gosnell, who is charged with killing his wife last winter was arrested in Haywood county a few days ago, and is now in jail at Marshall.

The earthquake has reduced receipts on the turnpike road from Wilmington to Wrightsville, very remarkably. Fear of the earthquake caused it, the Star says.

Mecklenburg's court-house is so badly cracked that it will not be used until experts have examined it and pronounced as to its safety. The earthquake cracked it.

The people of Plymouth wish the Roper railway extended to that place. The road is now being built, and extends from Pantego to Lee's Mills.

Sassafras Fork township, Granville county, has voted \$100,000 to the Oxford & Clarksville railroad company. The company has been waiting for this vote before taking any steps. Movement towards beginning work upon the road will probably be made very soon.

Friday night sheriff Tweed, of Madison county, arrested George Smith, charged with committing a murder in Tennessee some time ago. He fills the man wanted. The rewards offered amount to \$450, the Asheville Advance says.

Burglars are yet at work at Wilmington, where Saturday night they entered the residence of Mrs. Gerken, and at Goldsboro, where Friday night they robbed the residence of Rabbi Marx Mezes of a quantity of table furniture, etc.

The qualified voters of Brunswick county yesterday voted on the question of "Subscription" or "No subscription" of \$100,000 to the capital stock of the South Atlantic & Northwestern railroad company. The people of Brunswick are anxious for the road, which will have its eastern terminus at Smithville.

It is rumored, the Durham Recorder says, that there will be a called meeting of the disgruntled citizens of Durham county, to meet in Durham Saturday week. This is called the fourth party. The object will be to endorse the candidacy of the originators of the movement, who failed to be nominated by the democratic convention.

Union county democratic convention assembled Saturday and nominated the following: For Governor, C. A. Ashcraft; clerk, G. C. McLarty, present incumbent; sheriff, J. P. Horne, present incumbent; treasurer, M. L. Stevens, present incumbent; register of deeds, F. H. Wolfe, present incumbent; coroner, H. C. Moore; surveyor, J. O. L. Bickers.

A colored boy near New Berne was bitten a few days ago by a rattlesnake, and as medical aid was out of reach the boy must have surely died but for the thoughtful aid of his companions. The Journal says they dug a hole in the ground and placed both legs in it up to near the hips and poked the mud securely around him. The poison was entirely extracted and the boy is now about well.

A letter from Oxford seems to the tobacco crop does not seem to be so promising as it was a few weeks back. A good deal has been cured, and although the color generally is pretty good, the tobacco is unusually short and small, and is probably lighter than it was thought it would be. Some of the buyers are confidently expecting a "boom" in the market. Very little of the new crop has been sold there yet.

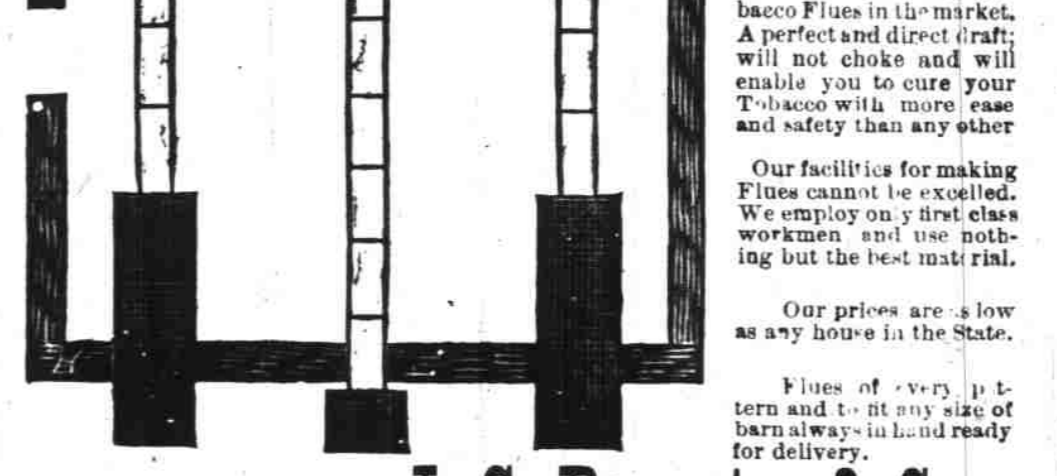
