The Terminal Matter. The situation in regard to the Richmond Terminal Company may be briefly explained as follows: "The railroad line between Nor folk, on the coast, and Memphis, on the Mississippi river, was originally built by the East Tennesser, Mem phis and Charleston, now controlled by the East Tennessee and the At-lantic, Mississippi and Ohio compa-nies (the last named now know as the Norfolk and Western). The Norfolk and Western's line runs from Norfolk to Bristol, the East Tennessee's main line being from Beistol to Memphis. The East Tennessee is at present controlled through its preferred stock, of which \$6,500,000 (being the majority) is owned by the Richmond Terminal company. This control, however, will expire in two years, when it will revert to all the stock, both common preferred, of which there is about \$57,000,000 outstand ing. Some years ago the East Ten-nessee, Virginia and Georgia Air Line Transportation company was formed, with Mr. Henry Fink as its president, and a con ract was made by it with the East Tennessee and Norfolk and Western railway companies for through business. This contract was for a long term of years (in perpetuity practically), and there- At two o'clock this morning the wind ore still exists

"As the control of the East Tenpessee system will pass from the Richmond Terminal in about two years, the latter sought to make good its prospective loss in this respect by leasing the Fast Tennessee to the Richmond and Danville Company, which it also controls, but the courts declared the lease to be illegal. Then the Richmond Terminal people, fore-seeing loss of control in the near future, made overtures to the Norfolk and Western Company to take off their hands the East Tennesses preferred stock. It was on this point that the negotiations of recent days have been going or, but it now appears as if they were to come to noth ing, owing to the difficulty of appears ing the many interests comprised in the Richmond Terminal control.




