"Section 2 That for the purpose providing a system of sewerage for the city of Raleigh, or of making o her pub lic improvements in the city of saleigh or for either or both of such purposes -s aud when the Board of Aldermen may determine, the city of Baleigh is hereby suthorized and empowered to issue its bonds, from time to time, to an amount not exceeding Seventy-five Thousand Dollars in the aggregate, of such denominations and such pr por tions as the said Board of Aldermen may deem advisable, bearing interest from the date thereof at a rate not exceeding five (5) per centum per annum, with interest coupons attached, payable half yearly at such place or places as may be deemed dvisable by said bonis, said bonds to be of such form and tenor and transferable in such way and the principal thereof payable or redeemable at such time or times, not exceeding fifty years from the date thereof and at such place or places as the Board of Aldermen men may determine.
