GRAIN FEEDS THE FLAMES.

Fire in the Wells Elevator Destroys Thousands of Bushels of Grain--Loss \$250,000.

By Telegraph to the News and Observer. BUFFALO, N. Y., Nov. 6 .- At 2 o'clock this morning fire was discovered in C. J. Wells' elevator, corner of Ohio and Indiana streets. The flames started in the east lower elevator from an explosion, loud enough to wake up hundreds of people who in boarding houses and tenements in the vicinity. In the shortest time possible the various boats which lay alongside the elevator were gotten out of the way and none suffered. In twenty minutes after the flames started the walls began to fall in on all sides. On the north were four Lackawanna freight cars loaded. These were buried in the debris. Mugride's bakery on the corner of Eik and Illinois streets, caught on fire, but was saved. The heat was intense, driving the

firemen away from the Ohio street side of the burning eleva or.
