\$33,000,000 APPROPRIATED

Washington, July 17.-The Senate and House conferees on the river and harbor appropria tion bill today reached a complete agreement on an amended bill carrying a total appropriation of \$33,000.000. The bill as it passed the Senate was reduced in conference by \$905,000.

The \$6,000,000 appropriation for levee work along the Mississppi river, the biggest amend ment tacked on to the bill by the Senate, was an additional appropriation of \$300,000 for improvement of the Alleghany river in Pennsylvania and \$300. 000 for improvement of the Cape Fear river at or bolow.
