\$33,000,000 APPROPRIATED.

Washington, July 17.—The Senate and House conferees on the river and harbor appropriation bill today reached a complete agreement on an amended bill carrying a total appropriation of \$33,000,000. The bill as it passed the Senate was reduced in conference by \$900,000.

The \$6,000,000 appropriation for levee work along the Mississippi river, the biggest amendment tacked on to the bill by the Senate, was an additional appropriation of \$300,000 for improvement of the Alleghany river in Pennsylvania and \$300,000 for improvement of the Cape Fear river at or below Wilmington, N. C.

(These appropriations are perhaps alright for Waterways, but the people of the United States are beginning to think that some attention should be given also to the public Highways. Vast sums have been expended by the Government for many years to improve and better navigable streams, and many that are not navigable, but as yet very little has been done towards the idea of Public Roads which are of more importance than many of the streams, for which appropriations are made and we trust the time is not far distant when they will receive the attention of the Government in the way of liberal assistance. Some measure like that which senator Simmons of this state proposed will eventually be enacted and the sooner it comes the better, for the Government should look after the Highways just as it does the Waterways—News)

Farmers' Convention.

The tenth annual State farmers' convention will be held at the A. and M. College, Raleigh, August 27-28 and 29. The program is almost complete and speakers of national reputation have been secured.

Dr. C. G. Hopkins, of the Illinois Experiment Station, will discuss "The Use of Rock Phosphate as a Fertilizer." Dr. Hopkins is considered the best authority in the United States on this subject. Other speakers for the first day are Prof. C. L. Goodrich, Washington, D. C., on "Humus"; E. G. Moss, of Granville, on "The Quality as Compared with Yield of Tobacco;" Prof. W. F. Massey, apostle of the co-ops, and Mr. Bradford Knapp, in charge of the demonstration work in the South.

The second day is live stock day. C. L. Opperman and Mr. Helmer Rabild, of Washington, D. C., Mr. E. B. Moore, of Charlotte, will talk on subjects related to the production of live stock. Also on this day the North Carolina Breeders' Association will hold their second annual sale of 50 pure bred Berkshire hogs.

The third day will be economic day. Dr. J. L. Coulter, of the Census Bureau, will discuss "Farmers' Co-operative Societies." Mr. J. G. Brown, of Raleigh, will speak on "The Relation of the Banking System to the Farmer." Mr. J. W. Bailey, of Raleigh, on "The Torrens System of Registering Land Titles."

A special program is being prepared for women and will be announced later. For complete program or information, address I. O. Schaub, Secretary, West Raleigh, N. C.
