Sunday at 11:10 A. M. the members and friends re-assembled to hear the annual sermon

of the Convention preached by Rev. J. A. Bonner, of Wilmington, pastor of Chestnut Street Presbyterian church.

Rev. R. N. Cowan assisted in the service, reading Acts first chapter, beginning at the 34th

verse. Prayer was offered by Rev. A. A. Smith, pastor of the Missionary Baptist church. Rev. Cowan then presented the speaker of the hour, Rev. Bonner took for his text the 34th verse of the 10th chapter of Acts, "Who went about doing good." Rev. Bonner handled this subject in a very masterly way; while the congregation sat spellbound and listened so as not to miss one word the speaker said. Dr. Bonner pictured the good which the Master did as He went about, not by force, but by love. He then called upon his hearers to so walk in the footsteps of the Master. He closed his remarks with a very effectual prayer.

After singing "Pass Me Not, O Gentle Saviour," the collection was raised by Mr. J. F. Albritton and Mr. C. D. Sauls, which amounted to \$12.57. The service closed by singing the doxology, and benediction by Rev. J. A. Bonner.

At 8:30 P. M., the Convention reassembled for its last session for 1931. After song services and devotions a popular program under the direction of Misses Freeman and Sutton and Miss Toward, was rendered. The program consisted of vocal and piano solos, duets, select readings and orations, all of which were enjoyed by those present.

The Committee on Resolutions of Thanks reported. The resolutions were read by Miss Frances Freeman.

Mrs. S. C. Baskerville was elected as the alternate to the delegate to the School of Methods which convenes in Franklinton.

Collection was raised by Rev. W. D. Burgess and Mr. R. D. Moore which amounted to \$4.25.

The Finance Committee reported \$53.67 raised during the Convention. This was very encouraging and shows that a greater pride is being taken in the financial welfare of the Convention.

Rev. L. E. Fairley, one of the veterans of Cape Fear Presbytery, made a forceful appeal to the young folks and the old as well to lay aside every weight and the sins which so easily beset them and to run with patience the race that is set before them and look to Him who is the Author and Finisher of our faith and the giver of every good and perfect gift.

We wish to commend the ministers of the Presbytery for their loyal attendance during the sessions of the Convention and we pray that they may continue the good work.
