Section 2. That any person who shall violate the foregoing section by denying to any person, entitled to its benefits, except for reasons by law applicable to citizens of every race and color, and regardless of any previous condition of servitude, the full enjoyment of any of the accommodations, advantages, facilities or privileges in said section enumerated, or inciting such denial, shall for every such offense forfeit and pay the sum of \$500 to the person aggrieved thereby, to be recovered in an action on the case, with full costs, and shall also for every such offense be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not more than \$1,000, provided, that the party aggrieved shall not recover if he has refused burial, and when the offense is a refusal of burial, the penalty may be recovered by the heirs-at-law of the person whose body has been refused burial.
