TABLE I. SUNDAY LETTERS.

Calendar table showing days of the week (A-G) and months (1-12) for the year 1800.

TABLE II.

Table showing days of the month for each month of the year.

Find the Sunday letter of the year in Table I. Look for the same letter in Table II, in the same horizontal line with the name of the given month, and over it are all the Sundays in that month.

EXAMPLE.—Find the 24th of October, 1836. The Sunday letter in Table I, above the year 1836 is B. Look for B on the right of Oct. in Table II, and over it are all the Sundays in October, viz.: the 2d, 9th, 16th, 23d, and 30th.

Example for dates in the months of January or February of a leap-year.—Find what day of the week the 24th of January 1872 came on. The dash preceding '72 is in the second column of Table I. The Sunday letter at the head of which is G. Now look for G on the right of January in Table II, and over it are all the Sundays in January for the year specified.

*Leap-year occurs every fourth year. Any year which, divided by four leaves no remainder is leap-year
