> AN EX-MINISTER OF STATE IN RAGS. - A correspondent of the Augsburg Allgemente

Zeitung writes: "In the streets of Brussels may be seen, from time to time, an old, poorly elad man, with snow-white hair, a fine, expressive face, and beautiful, intelligent eyes. His black dress-coat is threadbare, and his cap so weather-stained that it would be impossible to tell the color of the cloth of which it is made. His form is bent with gout, and yet he always walks very briskly, cane in hand. Sometimes he has a loaf of bread under his arm, a bottle of beer, or a little batter on a cabbage leaf. Every time l pass him, I bow to him, though personally I do not know him. The man lives in a miserable garret in the rue de Marais, where there is no fire in the winter; a poor bed, a few chairs, an old secretary, books and manuscripts, comprise his furniture .--This man is Joachim Lelewell, now 70 years of age, the most celebrated Polish writer of modern times, who, during the instruction, and since 1833 has lived at-Brussels.
