Harrington; at Carthage, under the direction of Dr. Turner, W. D. Richardson, Sam'l. Hartnett, Col. John Morrison, and S. C. Bruce; at Rockingham, (Richmond County), under the direction of Col. H. W. Harrington, Wm. P. Leak, R. S. McDonald and Walter F. Leek; at Troy, (Montgomery County) under the direction of Samuel H. Christian, John S. Chambers, Robt. A. Chambers and D. S.
