A young man named Charles Thrash attempted to get upon a train at South Acton, on the Fitchburg road, last Saturday afternoon, one of the wheels being lost its balance, was thrown under the wheels, had his right arm cut off, and died of his injuries at the South Boston Hospital the same night.

Two lads named Hayes and Robinson went out gunning at Mahoboston (N. H.) last Friday afternoon, and while Robinson was playfully keeping his companion from stealing apples from his pocket by warning him off with his gun, the dangerous plaything was discharged and its entire contents lodged in poor Hayes's breast. The lad died in about an hour.

Mrs. Cunningham, who did not appear in court, when called the other day in New York, is said to be in Mobile. She is liable to forfeit \$5,000 recognizance by her absence.

Maquitos have been so thick on Long Island that the workmen on the Brooklyn waterworks were compelled to quit work, and flee to their houses.

The amount expended by American travelers in Europe is estimated at \$10,000,000 annually.

In Cincinnati, an apothecary put up liquid ammonia instead of essence of cinnamon, and Newberry, a baker, died from taking it.

In Orange county, Va., typhoid fever prevails among the colored population. One planter has lost 19 slaves.

Daniel W. King, a respectable citizen of Suffield, Connecticut, has pleaded guilty of a charge of forgery, and is sentenced to the State prison for a term of six years. His father, a man of considerable wealth, died of grief soon after his son's arrest.
