LETTER FROM HON. WILLIAM J. GRAHAM.

The following letter, says the New York Express, was read to the Whig General Committee at its session on the 4th inst.

BULLDOGS, N. C., Feb. 25, 1859. GENTLEMEN: I regret that my absence from home and indispensable engagements have thus long delayed the acknowledgment of your letter of the 7th inst.

GALANT ACT OF AN ENGINEER.—On the night of the 22d ult., as the passenger train was passing along the New Albany and Salem railroad, near Linden, Ind., the engineer perceived a lantern figure ahead, and instantly blew his whistle and shut down brakes.
