MUCH IN LITTLE.

An aerial ship called the City of New York, intended for a trans-Atlantic voyage, has been in the sources of construction for some months past in the vicinity of New York, and is now so mearly completed that she will be ready to undertake the trip in October. — The aeronaut who has charge of the enterprise is Mr. Lowe, of New Hampshire, who has made several suc-cessful ascensions.
