The excavations were so long and so deep, that few hands could work in them to advantage. The cost of graduation alone of the tenth mile was upwards of \$26,-000, and of five consecutive miles further on upwards of \$80,000.

"We refer with pleasure to the resolutions which look to a speedy extension of the road to the North Carolina road. It is understood that some gentlemen along the line have expressed a wish to take contracts for graduation to be paid for in stock. And we learn that the face of the country is believed to be such that the road can be built for \$12,000 a mile.
