

DEAR ANSON: The city is dull. Only a few of our large houses have received their full Fall stocks, and as yet buyers are scarce. Hot weather, fears of cholera, fever, &c., and scarcity of money in the rural districts, will delay the "season" longer than in days gone by. Yet all are confident of a very large trade and are making preparations accordingly. The sanitary condition of the city was never better at this season than now—although one undoubted case of yellow fever has occurred—so pronounced by one of our most eminent physicians. This was some eight days ago, and no other case appearing all alarm has subsided. There are some cases of "broken-house," always more annoying than dangerous. No cholera, nor indications of it.

Among the improvements rapidly approaching completion may be mentioned the rebuilding of the magnificent block of stores on Hayne street, opposite the Charleston Hotel, destroyed by fire during the war. By contract they were to be ready for occupation by last fall, but unavoidable delays occurred, and some two or three weeks must yet pass ere the holders can "move in." They will be occupied by some of our oldest and best firms.

The Hotel itself is being refitted and decorated in a manner highly creditable to the liberality and enterprise of its proprietors, Messrs. White & Mixer. The large dining hall, on which painters and upholsterers are now busily engaged, will soon be one of the most beautiful rooms in the country—rivaling in splendor with the vaulted saloons of New York and Philadelphia.

Other great changes are in progress, and the time-honored House will soon resume its pristine position of favor with the public. The Mills House is likewise undergoing extensive repairs and improvements.

Starting out yesterday to see your friends W. O. Bennett & Co., on business connected with my profession, I found their office surrounded by scaffolding and full of workmen, while one of the firm stood by the side of that sturdy Scotchman, Capt. John Ferguson, proprietor of the property, looking with a pleased eye at the work of remodeling and re-arranging the office. It will be commodious and comfortable when completed, and of course will be the favorite resort for all the Pea Dee people on their visits to the city. I noticed near one hundred bales of cotton on the wharf consigned to W. O. B. & Co., which for these dull times is a good business. And by-the-way, the absent members of the house would do well to hurry up matters at home and come along to Accommodation Wharf, for that "gay and festive youth," who now alone represents the concern, has a little more on his hands than he can attend to, and says he'll be—(if he ain't) going away soon himself. Fact is he needs watching.

I was much impressed with the force of "war's desolation" yesterday, when a leading jeweler exhibited to me a set of diamonds which had been left with him for sale. They belong to an old and once very wealthy family, and have been handed down through successive generations for more than a century. Intrinsically most gorgeous, valuable and magnificent gems, worth thousands of dollars, they were chiefly valued for the associations connected with them—and an offer to purchase them at any price would have been resented as a deep affront. But alas! now the owners are despoiled of their vast possessions and reduced to want—Kilpatrick and his fraternity of thieves visited them—and these loved relics are offered for sale! Sad reflections arose as I gazed upon them—memories of the past thronged around, and my thought on leaving was—"Wish I was rich I'd buy them, for I know a snowy brow to which if *ought could they possibly*, might add a charm though their brilliant light would be eclipsed by the 'bright blue eyes' which would shine so dear." And then I meandered across the street to No. 800 and invested my last quarter.

It is pleasing to see the National Express and Transportation Company—Gen. J. E. Johnson, President—gaining ground and already doing a large business. Developments are being made rather damaging to its wealthy and ungenerous competitor, (controlled by Northern capital) and the National will soon be an established institution if the people, who ought to, will patronize it. I can personally vouch for the uniform attention to business of its officers here—including such men as Gen. Walker, Mr. Woodward (so favorably known every where), and others like them ever courteous, polite and accommodating.

A serious accident occurred at the Mills House last night. Mr. Lindsay, a merchant from York district, fell from a third story window and died in a few hours from injuries received. He is spoken of by all as a worthy and exemplary gentleman, and much regret is expressed at the sad occurrence. Respectfully, &c., Q. E. D.
