SEYMOUR AND BLAIR MEETING IN SMITH'S PRECINCT.

According to previous notice, the citizens of the Smith district assembled at the Horne School House, on Saturday, 22d Aug., 1868, for the purpose of forming an organization to be known as the Pee Dee Seymour and Blair Club

The following committee was appointed on retions: R. Crump, T. C. Capel, R. P. Allen, N. D. McLauchlin, C. B. Lindsey, H. Hough, who reported

as follows: Resolved, 1st, That we hereby express our unqualified approval of the platform of principles adopted by the recent National Convention in New York, believing that if those principles can be carried into effeet, and the nominees of said Convention be elected, a happy, peaceful, and lasting settlement of the exist-

ing political troubles will be the result.

2d, That we organize here to-day a Campaign Club, to be composed of all voters of the precinct opposes to the dangerous and iniquitous doctrines of the Rad-

ical Republican party. 3d, That, as members of the Conservative Democratic party, we feel ourselves forced, in self-defence. after the declarations of Radical leaders and the action of those voters amongst us dependent upon us for support, to declare that we will, in hiring laborers, always give preference to those who vote with us; and, unless great changes take place, shall, when present contracts expire, be compelled to adopt still more

definite and stringent measures. 4th, That, in the passage of the police bill by the State Legislature, we recognise the dangerous experiment of placing an armed force under the unlimited centrol of a man-Gov. Holden-whose acts seem to he wholly prompted by selfish ambition and hatred of the virtuous and intelligent masses who have repeatedly refused to confer upon him the office which he now holds, and look upon it as a measure fraught with danger to the best interests of the people and

Col. E. R. Liles, being present, was called on for speech. He responded with some brief but patriotic and well-timed remarks.

Messre. J. M. Smith and L. P. Crump, being requested to receive the names of those wishing to besome members of the Club, reported 21 whites and applored.
