Escape. Two of the prisoners confined in jail on a charge of Larceny, made their escape by cutting a hole in the over-head ceiling and taking out brick in the North gable end of the jail and fastening their blankets together, thus forming a way of descent. There were three in the room—the upper dungeon—the same heretofore noticed as having been engaged in mousing persons on the highway and snatching money from them. They were first charged with Highway Robbery and a bill found against them for that crime was subsequently ignored, and a new bill sued out for Larceny which was found a true bill, by the Grand Jury. On application they were allowed to give bail in \$600 each, the bond to be justified before J. H. Judge Russell, fearing they could not make the bond satisfactorily, or that if they could it would not prove as serviceable as £600 each, they resorted to the latter. When the second one was descending the blanket tore apart and let him fall a considerable distance, leaving his profile on the ground. He was so hurted bruised that he left his house, which he had thrown down before he attempted to follow. The ladder, being broken, the other prisoner had to remain, having no material out of which to construct a ladder.

The jailor, Mr. W. C. Threlfall, has sent posters in all directions offering a reward of \$50, and telegraphed to various offices for their re-arrival. The names of the escaped prisoners are Glasgow Williams and Alister Stewart. They have a number of friends about Wilmington, and are, no doubt, part of a gang of robbers who have been going around the country and committing larcenies.
