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THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

NINETEENTH DAY.

Convention met at 10 o'clock, President in the chair. By Mr. Blocker, a motion was adopted to adjourn until the 4th of October. The convention adjourned.

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

The ordinance in relation to mixed schools was taken up at the unfinished business of Saturday. The substitute was adopted.

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

Mr. Wither's amendment, introduced on Saturday, was adopted. The question then recurred on the Crosby amendment.

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

Mr. Withers said the amendment introduced by Mr. Tourgee proposed only to amend the express stipulation in regard to separate schools for the two races.

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

An ordinance in relation to the preservation of the school fund, requiring the same to be paid into the County Treasurers, and by them distributed, was informally laid over on motion of Mr. Morehead, who is Chairman of the Education Committee.

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

Section 1. The proceeds of all lands that have been or hereafter may be granted by the United States to this State, and not otherwise appropriated by this State or the United States; also all moneys, stocks, bonds, and other property now belonging to any State fund for purposes of education; also the net proceeds of all sales of the swamp lands belonging to the State, and also all other grants, gifts or slaves that have been or hereafter may be made to this State, and not otherwise appropriated by the State or by the terms of the grant or conveyance, shall be paid into the State Treasury, and together with so much of the ordinary revenue of the State as may be by law set apart for that purpose, shall be faithfully appropriated for establishing and maintaining in this State a system of public schools and for other purposes of education.

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

Section 2. All moneys, stocks, bonds, and other property belonging to a county school fund; also the net proceeds from the sale of strays; also the net proceeds of all penalties and forfeitures, and of all fines collected in the several counties for any breach of the penal or military laws of the State; and all moneys which shall be paid by persons as an equivalent for exemption from military duty, shall belong to and remain in the several counties and shall be faithfully appropriated for establishing and maintaining free public schools in the several counties of this State.

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

Mr. Tourgee, offered the following amendment which was adopted: "That the amount collected in each county should be annually reported to the Supl. of Public Instruction, to come in at the end of the 2nd."

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

After considerable discussion the ordinance passed its second reading. Mr. McCabe moved a suspension of the rules to put on ordinance on the 19th reading. Failed.

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

Ordinance No. 137, to amend art. 13, sec. 14, of the constitution in reference to the rotation of Judges, taken and the following substitute recommended by the Committee:

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

The Committee on the Judicial Department, to which was referred Resolution No. 137, have considered the same, and recommend the adoption of the following substitute:

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

That every Judge of the Superior Court shall reside in the district for which he is elected. The Judges shall preside in the Courts of the different districts successively, but no Judge shall hold the Court in the same district oftener than once in four years; but in case of the protracted illness of the Judge assigned to preside in any district, or any other unavoidable accident to him, by reason of which he shall become unable to preside, the Governor may require any Judge to hold one or more special terms in said district, in lieu of the Judge assigned to hold the Court of said district. A number of amendments were offered by the Republican side but they were all voted down.

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

The bill then passed its second reading. Adjourned.
