A. J. Burton, Esq., News Editor of the Raleigh News, is still confined to his sick room.

COTTON forms have appeared in Craven County, on the farm of F. D. Sutcher, who has cotton eighteen inches high.

Gen. Alfred Dockery, has resigned his position as member of the State penitentiary board, and Thos. H. Briggs, of Raleigh, has been elected to fill the vacancy.

Board of Aldermen—Extracts from the Proceedings.

At an adjourned session of the Board, held last evening, the following proceedings were had:

Petition of Dr. J. Francis King, President College of Physicians and Surgeons, in reference to the condition of Burgwin Alley, was referred to the Committee on Streets and Wharves for report.

A petition of numerous residents of First Ward for street lamps, cisterns and opening of streets, was referred to the Committee on Streets and Wharves for report.

Petition of real estate owners and business men on Market, between Water and Front streets, for the removal of the city Market House, was presented.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the petition be referred to a special Committee, appointed by the Mayor, with instructions to confer with the petitioners and others as to the amount of assistance probable to be obtained from them towards the removal of the nuisance, complained of, and to recommend a site for the location of the City Market.

Aldermen Brink, Grainger and Kercher constitute the Committee.

At 9 o'clock, Alderman Rumley called up the matter of the Mayor trying violations of the city ordinances.

Considerable discussion ensued. Finally Alderman Grainger submitted the following, which was adopted:

It having been brought to the notice of this Board that according to an act passed at the last session of the Legislature of North Carolina, it is the duty of the Mayor to hold Court for the trial of persons charged with misdemeanors in the city.

Resolved, That the Mayor is hereby instructed to hold such Court on and after Monday, the 17th inst., provided the City Attorney instructs him that it is legal for him to do so; and the Mayor is hereby instructed to call upon him for such opinion at once.

Petition of Chas. A. Price to erect a wooden building on his premises, was referred to Committee on Fire Department with power to act.

A lamp was ordered to be placed at the corner of Anderson and Miller streets.

On motion of Alderman Radcliff the Board went into an election of Chief Engineer of the Fire Department. On

the first ballot P. M. Rice received 5 votes and N. Gerken 5. On the second ballot Rice was elected, having received 6 votes to Gerken's 4.

An election for Assistant Engineer was then entered into. On the sixth ballot Owen Dove was elected.

Alderman Brink moved that P. M. Rice be Chief Fire Warden of the city. Laid over until next meeting.

Wm. Cutler was elected Day Janitor and Wm. H. Waddell Night Janitor for the ensuing year.

Ed. Davis was elected Health Officer. Wm. Myers was elected lamp lighter for the northern and Mike Hooper for the southern districts of the city.

Dan O'Connor was elected standard keeper.

Abram Mosely was elected City Scavenger.

On motion of Alderman Heyer, the Mayor was authorized to purchase one hundred and fifty tons of paving stones, at a cost not to exceed \$1 per ton.

A resolution limiting the police force to 2 captains and 16 privates, was referred to the Committee on Police.

Alderman Grainger offered the following resolutions, which were referred to the Finance Committee:

Resolved, That from and after June 14th, 1872, and for one year thereafter, all city advertising be done only in that Wilmington newspaper having the largest bona fide city circulation on the 1st day of June, 1872, and that the question of circulation shall be determined without further action of this Board, by such affidavits of the Proprietors of the city papers as shall be filed with the City Clerk and Treasurer within the next ten days, these affidavits to state unequivocally the actual bona fide city circulation on the 1st day of June, 1872, of the daily editions of the respective newspapers to which they refer.

Resolved, That the Clerk and Treasurer furnish a copy of the foregoing resolution to the Proprietors of the city papers.

Resolved, That all the printing of the city be given by contract to the lowest bidder.

The Board then adjourned to the first Monday in July.

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

From Washington.
WASHINGTON, D. C., June 14.
Indications are almost positive from the special and regular sources, and some official outgivings here that the Washington Treaty has failed.

The British ministry, have declined at present, an answer to the question in parliament whether the Geneva fizzle Plasco don't describe the failure, which involves Plasco, in the San Juan boundary question, which Emperor William, of Germany is arbitrating?

From New York.
NEW YORK, June 14.
The Union League club unanimously endorsed the Philadelphia Erie road, which has commenced suit against Jay Gould for eight millions of dollars. This is said to be precursor for other heavy suits.

Fifteen thousand iron and metal workers, struck yesterday for eight hours and twenty per cent advance on piece work. This is the most formidable strike yet made, they are thoroughly organized and have a fund.

The Wheelrights and Blacksmiths also struck.

Six sun-strokes yesterday.

Teale C. Clavin was elected Colonel of the 8th colored regiment. The first vote stood as follows: Miss Clavin, 108; Scattering 50. There was great confusion, but the election was finally made unanimous.

The police hold several Railroad machine shops, the strikers having threatened to pull them down.

From New Hampshire.
CONCORD, June 14.
The Republican caucus nominated Bainbridge Wadleigh on the 5th ballot. The 1st ballot was as follows: Patterson, 102; Rollins, 67; Wadleigh, blank. Wadleigh is a prominent lawyer, aged 31.

From Wisconsin.
MILWAUKEE, June 14.
The Democratic State Convention passed resolutions endorsing the Cincinnati platform and nominees.

From Massachusetts.
SELMMA, June 14.
The Congressional Democratic Convention refused to instruct the delegates to Baltimore for the Cincinnati platform and nominees.

From Pennsylvania.
PHILADELPHIA, June 14.
There was quite a large meeting of the workmen here—nearly all the trades were represented. Resolutions were passed in favor of the eight hour league.

From Missouri.
ST. LOUIS, June 14.
Notwithstanding the rain about 15,000 persons attended the Sangerfest.
