LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

From New York.

New York, June 15.

Several fires in the squares and Central Park were torn up by a tornado this afternoon. Several small vessels in the harbor lost spars and had their sides torn.

CITY OF MEXICO, June 15, via Havana.

Congress has adjourned after passing a tariff bill and a bill granting ample facilities to the President. Peace prevails in a majority of the States. Disturbances continue in Julisco, San Luis Potosi, the Sierra Puebla and Northern provinces. Rumors of Cabinet changes are unfounded.

The tornado yesterday created great damage; many persons were hurt here and in Brooklyn.

A vigilance committee has been formed in Western New York to punish incendiaries. Arrived—steamship United States.

Early this morning information reached police headquarters that the strikers were massing in 19th and 21st precincts, where are the largest cabinet and piano factories. Superintendent Kelso ordered the reserves of the neighboring precincts to march to the threatened districts and to protect person and property at every hazard, and then went himself to 19th precinct, while inspector Dill went to 21st. Stehway's factory was besieged by three hundred men as early as 6 o'clock, but the police drove them off. A large crowd of strikers soon afterwards getting in front of a cabinet factory in 42d street near 3d avenue, a Sergeant of police and a patrolman were stationed there and kept the strikers at bay until the arrival of a detachment of police, who were obliged to use their clubs freely to disperse the strikers.

From Ohio.

CINCINNATI, June 15.

The testimony in the plank road distillery in the case involving the claims on the part of the Government for three hundred thousand dollars closed to-day. Judge Mathews in behalf of the Government withdrew the charges against two of the defendants, J. W. Goff and Peter Schwab. It was shown in the testimony that Goff, since the first Internal Revenue went into operation, has paid to the Government twenty-two million dollars for tax.

From Missouri.

ST. LOUIS, June 15.

At the Liberal State committee meeting the State convention was postponed until after the Baltimore convention, Schurz and Brown were present. Both advised a conciliatory course towards the democrats.

From Connecticut.

NORWICH, June 15.

A hull storm passed over Connecticut this afternoon, covering a belt of twenty miles wide, and greatly damaging the vegetation.

From Massachusetts.

BY CABLE.

LONDON, June 15.

The meeting at Geneva was postponed until a late hour this P. M., on account of the non-arrival of an arbitrator.

A Geneva special says: One of the commissioners has just stated that nothing is at present known as to what answer the arbitrators will give to the English demand for an adjournment. It is probable that an opportunity will be given to state the matter of difference before the arbitrators. Neither side now apprehend a failure.

GENEVA, June 15.

Nearly all the gentlemen connected with the board of arbitration under the treaty of Washington have arrived here. It is believed the board will adjourn immediately after meeting, but if an agreement to adjourn cannot be reached, and the meeting is prolonged the session will undoubtedly be secret.
