**I. O. O. M.**—The members of this order are requested to meet at the City Hall this evening at 8 o'clock. A punctual and full attendance is requested.

The prisoner John Anderson who was caught at Rocky Point on yesterday by Capt Langston, of the W. & W. Railroad, charged with stealing a watch on Thursday evening last, from Mr. A. B. Perseo, at Weldon, was delivered up to him this morning by the city authorities, Mr. P. having been deputized to convey the prisoner to Weldon. Mr. Perseo has also obtained possession of the watch.

The city clock last night got on a strike and had a high old time of it, whether through sympathy with the demonstrations that were being made over the Ward elections for delegates to the County Convention or not, we do not pretend to say, but we do say that the hour of night could not be told by the number of strokes on the bell, so irregular were they. We suppose, however, that the clock is now ashamed of itself, as we observe this morning that it is busily holding both its hands before its face.

**OPERA HOUSE.**—A poor audience disheartened the young amateurs last night. This was the more surprising, considering the object for which the performance was given. Of course the audience was greatly bored with the long stage waits and clumsily managed scenery, but much of the acting was really good. The tableau was well arranged and the situations thrilling enough for the old Bowery itself. Mr. Alderman and Mr. Agostini deserve praise, though the latter gentleman does not speak distinctly enough. The pantomime of Humpty Dumpty was, of course, simply a few tricks and tedious waits, but the audience, as patient as a church, calmly waited for the next trick, as though a matter of course. Much of the performance was good—for amateurs—and we hope they may perform here again.

**LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.**  
From Washington.  
WASHINGTON, D. C., June 21.  
Dispatches regarding the Fifth Avenue Hotel meeting are unsatisfactory and possibly, in many respects, untruthful. J. D. Cox presided. There was a large German representation. The Free Trade Democrats are vehement in opposition to Greeley, though the acceptance of Greeley is dominant. Trumbull saw no objection to support Greeley. Schurz said he must support Greeley from necessity. Schurz suggested a call of the States—Alabama, for Greeley, Forsyth spokesman; Arkansas, Greeley, Senator Rice spokesman; Connecticut, anti-Greeley, Mr. Wells spokesman; (but Mr. English said the Democrats of Connecticut were all for Greeley); Georgia, Greeley, Henry W. Hillier spokesman; Illinois—Horace White, of Chicago, said the Democratic and Republican parties had served their purposes and Greeley was the best man to cut both in two; Iowa—Gen. Fritz Henry Warner disapproved Greeley, but should the Baltimore Convention nominate Greeley Iowa would go for him; Kentucky—Waterson said all the paths that go from Greeley lead to Grant, and therefore, all who go for Greeley go for the enfranchisement of the South; Massachusetts—Atkinson was for Free Trade, regardless of Grant or Greeley; New York—Parke Godwin strongly denounced the support of Greeley under any circumstances. The Conference adjourned at 1 o'clock this morning.

The Democratic State Convention reaffirms the principles of their recent State Conventions, and urges the union of all elements against Grant, and instructs their delegates to vote as a unit for Greeley. The feeling is evidently dominant.  
Another statement regarding the Fifth Avenue Conference says Senator Trumbull delivered a short address in which he said: "To the question that comes uppermost among us there is only one answer which occurs to me reasonable or possible. How are we to defeat Grant by supporting Greeley?"  
"Carl Schurz said respecting the Cincinnati nominees, perhaps a better ticket could have been devised and perhaps not. Greeley is now before the people and his name cannot be withdrawn. Overwhelming waves of opinion are arising in his favor. It would be idiotic at this juncture to attempt to stay its progress. The Senator expressed his opinion that if Mr. Greeley was to be elected as he would be by an overwhelming vote, he could select from all parties such a cabinet, and draw around him such men as a nation would place entire confidence in.  
The World editorial treats the conference as a "Fiasco."  
The Herald thinks the conference develops that the Democratic party old and young will go for Greeley.

The Times says, it amounted to nothing. The Tribune believes that nothing but good has resulted from the Conference.
