NEW YORK, June 26.  
Brooks, Phillips & Sons, charged with undervaluation invoices of Macaroni.  
The Oil cloth Manufacturing strikers resumed work at ten hours.  
The locomotive and machine shops at Patterson, N. J., closed in consequence of a strike of some 600 men, throwing nearly 3,000 persons out of employment.
