## GRAND REPUBLICAN JUBILEE.

Immense Torchlight Procession.  
Soul-stirring Speeches.

Three-quarters of a Mile of Solid Republicans.  
THE OLD NORTH STATE O. K.

All day yesterday there came into our city from the East from the West from the North, and from the South, wagons loaded down with jubilant Republicans, eager to take part in the grand celebration of Republican principles that took place last night.

By eight o'clock of night there was congregated in and around the City Hall seven thousand dusky defenders of Union and Honesty. The flaming torches cast their lurid glare on faces whose every lineament bespoke joy and gratification.

At half past eight the procession began to form, and amid the glare of burning tar barrels, waving torches, thundering artillery, and heaven-reaching rockets, was soon in order.

Judge Cantwell addressed them in one of the most eloquent speeches we have ever listened to, and which we shall publish in full in tomorrow's issue.

The procession consisted of the several wards, led by bands of music. The route was made to include all of our principal streets, and the endeavor was made to pass and salute every house occupied by Republicans of note.

It was estimated that seven thousand people were in the procession. Not all in the street, but including the sidewalk followers.

At one time the head of the procession was at Market street and the rear torches were illuminating the houses at the corner of Seventh and Castle streets.

After occupying several hours in parading the streets, the band returned to the City Hall, where they were addressed by Hon. James Heaton, Messrs. George W. Mason and George M. Arnold.

The speeches called forth loud and prolonged applause. It was then disbanded and the members formed themselves into parties who promenade the streets till a late hour, singing Union songs and giving vent to their joyous feelings in other harmless ways.

The only drawback on the complete success of the jubilee was the demonstrations of some of the rascally boys and ruffians who followed the procession.

Their acts meet with our scorn and condemnation, and we can assure our citizens who were annoyed, that prompt action is being taken to bring these contemptible scoundrels to justice.

Mr. Geo. Mason has been sent to Mr. Schriver with orders to promptly remunerate him for the destruction perpetrated on his premises.

We can safely say in closing that the demonstration was one of the most successful, that our city has ever witnessed.

CONGRESS.—The meeting of the Sheriffs of the counties composing the Third Congressional District of the State of North Carolina, with Jesse J. Cassidy the Magistrate had the ten Electors of this county as provided for by law, took place at the appointed time at the Court House in this city at noon to-day.

## GRANT AND WILSON CLUB AT ABBOTTSTOWN.

The Republicans of Abbottstown met in Abbottsburg, on Monday evening and formed a "Grant and Wilson Club." The following are the officers: President, John W. Wallace; Vice Presidents, Wm. H. Williams and W. H. Fondville; Secretary, Alex. Pond; Treasurer, James Road; Corresponding Secretary, Jas. Cashwell. Nearly one hundred enrolled their names.

SMOKE.—At about half past twelve o'clock last night, policeman Davis, special health officer, was aroused from his bed by a call from Fanny Turner, keeper of a house of ill fame in the eastern part of the city, who reported that her house was in flames, and that she desired his assistance. Mr. Davis went promptly to the spot, and there discovered, in a room at the back part of the house over the piazza, a mattress and pillow, which had evidently been ignited, and was producing a heavy smoke.

Near the bed was found a handful of matches, which had evidently been used to kindle the fire. The contents of the room were immediately rendered innocuous. No traces could be discovered that would go to prove that the fire had been set from the outside. The whole matter looks very suspicious, and we hope that an investigation will be had that will throw the blame on the guilty party.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.—The bond of Sheriff Schenck was presented, but as the tax books were not ready for delivery it was voted to let it remain over till the first Monday in September.

Mrs. Elizabeth Falls of Harnett township was allowed \$6 dollars per month for her support.

Mrs. Wm. T. Rockley and Mrs. Elizabeth Wilson, were allowed four dollars each.

John D. Dasher and S. F. Potts were granted license to retail liquor in city limits.

Ordered, That the tax lists of real and personal property for the different townships of this county, be accepted, and that the Clerk of this Board give notice in the newspapers of the city, that this Board will attend at the Court House on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, 19th, 20th and 21st days of August, for the purpose of hearing complaints and revision of lists.

Ordered, That Commissioners John C. Heyer, E. M. Shoemaker and James A. Lowery constitute a committee to have the tax lists for the different townships prepared and placed in the hands of this Board at the earliest possible date.

The meeting adjourned, subject to the call of the Chairman.

## LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

### From Kentucky.

LOUISVILLE, August 14.—To-day an enormous business failure was developed here, involving one of the most prominent business men in the city. Robt. Atwood, a leading insurance agent and a member of the pork packing firm, who has been heavily speculating in cotton and stocks and became involved to the extent of a quarter of half million of dollars. He left on the Indianapolis train this evening, but was arrested by telegraph at Seymour, Indiana, and brought back at 11 o'clock to-night and was bailed in the sum of \$50,000 to appear at the police court to-morrow. It is charged that he has obtained large amounts from the banks on fraudulent drafts and on paper to which he forged the name of Dr. Lewis Rogers, his father-in-law and other prominent persons and business men. Nearly every bank in the city is a loser. Atwood was most highly connected, and the affair is creating a profound sensation in this city.

### From New York.

NEW YORK, August 15.—The North German Brig John Frederick Savina, from Lamar for Stettin, put in here in distress, having lost six men by yellow fever. The British ship Cathedral, from Pennsylvania for Liverpool, put in here, leaking very badly, there was 9 feet of water in the hold. She will be repaired here.

A terrific storm from midnight to daylight, extended throughout the State, the trains were delayed.
