CUSTOM HOUSE.—There was entered at the Custom House of Wilmington during the past week six coastwise vessels and one Foreign, cleared coastwise four, Foreign seven.

We are rejoiced that the Board of Aldermen have finished their appointments. The City Hall will now be free from the hungry hordes of position seekers. The daily conferences on the front steps had become a complete nuisance.

We collect the following from the books of the City Treasurer and Collector's office. The receipts for the week were: Real and personal taxes, \$1,153 73; special license, \$1,034 60; dray and dog tax, \$17 75; making a total of \$2,206 08.

ON the same days the decree was approved and signed naming the Right Rev. James Gibbons, now Vicar Apostolic of North Carolina, to be bishop of Richmond, Va., as the successor of Bishop McGill, deceased.—*Freeman's Journal.*

The storm yesterday at the mouth of the river was very severe, and was badly felt by vessels loading off the bar. The Frying Pan Shoals offered a good lee, and no serious accident occurred. Towards evening, the German Eagle Wega hoisted a signal of distress, which was immediately answered by the Revenue Steamer Seward. On boarding her, Capt. Carson found the Captain in great alarm at the supposed danger of his position. He was assured of the safety of his anchorage, and the Seward returned to her berth.

The Bank of New Hanover is about establishing a branch at Goldsboro'. Mr. E. B. Burden has been elected President, and Mr. R. P. Howell as Cashier. This new Bank must prove a success and of great benefit to the merchants and people of Goldsboro'. The officers chosen are both gentlemen of high standing in commercial circles, and are well known throughout the State.

In order to allow the people of Goldsboro' to become personally interested in the Bank, they are to be allowed the privilege of subscribing to \$25,000 worth of stock. We sincerely trust that this laudable enterprise will succeed, and that it will build up and renew the trade between our city and Goldsboro'.

DRAWING AT CITY HALL.—The drawing of the lottery scheme for the benefit of the Charity Hospital was continued last night.

There were 224 prizes drawn, the highest being for \$500, the lucky number was 2117. The \$1,000 prize is still in the wheel.

The drawing will be continued on Tuesday night. So far 553 prizes have been drawn.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.—The adjourned meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held last evening, his Honor Mayor Wilson presiding.

Several important matters were acted upon among which was the election of the police force.

The following information was reported by the Mayor regarding the street department. The present force consists of 30 laborers 7 mules and 7 carts. The gang is divided into four squads; one squad for paving and 3 men paving squad; foreman and 7 men; street sweepers, foreman and 7 men. We notice that among other important work accomplished by this department, is the digging of 12,000 yards of ditches in the upper parts of the city. The street gangs are given the following compensation per day: foreman paving squad, \$1.25 per day; foreman street sweepers, \$1.25 per day; foreman ditching squad, \$1.25 per day; foreman street sweepers and cleaners \$1.25 per day.

The remainder of the hands are paid \$1.12 1/2 per day. The power of discharging any member of the street force is vested in the Marshal.

The names of thirty applicants for positions on the street force were recommended by the Committee on Streets and Wharves, and the following resolution was passed:

Resolved, That the parties named in the report of the Committee on Streets and Wharves, constitute the street force of the city from and after Monday, the 19th inst.

The present appropriation of \$160 per month, to each of the steam fire engines was ordered to be continued. In the matter of the appropriation for the hand engine, "Brooklyn" further time was asked by the committee, and was granted.

Allen J. Denton (col.) was elected Superintendent of the street force on the tenth ballot.

The Board then passed the following orders:

Resolved, That the maximum rate of wages to be paid the street hands—except the foremen of the different squads, who shall receive \$1.37 1/2 per diem—shall be \$1.25 per day for the best hands, and for the others the compensation to be fixed by the Committee on Streets and Wharves at such rates as shall be equitable and just, to take effect on and after Monday, the 19th inst.

Resolved, That the Mayor shall have the power to discharge any of the policemen or street hands for cause, and fill the vacancies and report the same to the next meeting of the Board for confirmation or rejection.

A lamp was ordered to be placed corner of Fifth and Campbell streets.

Adjourned to meet first Monday in September.

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

PHILADELPHIA, August 17. Police officer Lewis H. Larc was shot after midnight, on Broad street, by Elsha Warrie, superintendent of Warne's shooting gallery. It is supposed the wound will prove mortal. Warrie has been arrested.

NEW YORK, August 17. A German, hawker and baggage carrier were severely injured by the wrecking of a train near Grodsburg yesterday. The passengers escaped.

PORTSMOUTH, August 17. At the Rye Beach clam bake yesterday, Mr. Greeley made a few humorous remarks on the subject of clams, and said nothing political. Secretary Robeson was also present, he spoke briefly, likewise avoiding politics. Mr. Greeley starts this morning directly for New York, via Boston.

PORTSMOUTH, August 17. The Republicans of the Second District nominated J. P. Rapier, colored, for Congress on the first ballot, over C. W. Buckley, late member of Congress.

SALT LAKE, August 17. The Indians of San Pete County are still on the war path. Infantry and cavalry will be immediately sent in their pursuit.

LONDON, August 17. A dispatch just received from Belfast states that riots have broken out on fresh severe fighting is now going on. The barracks of the police and several houses have been wrecked by the mob.

A special dispatch to the Standard from Paris, says that at the meeting of the Emperors in Berlin, a proposition will be made for a Congress of the European powers to sanction territorial modifications of France, the occupation of Rome, and a revision of the treaty of Paris of 1851.

GENEVA, August 17. The supplementary arguments of the American Consul before the Board has been published in pamphlet form. The arguments of Evans cover one hundred pages; those of Cushing and Waite are less extended.

LIVERPOOL, August 17.—Noon. Cotton opened quiet. Uplands 9 1/2 d; Orleans 10 1/2 d. Cotton shipments from Bombay to the 16th, since last report, 800 bales.
