It sup pressed a gigantic rebellion, emarci oated 4,000,000 of slaves, decided the equal citizenship of all, and established universal suffrage. Exhibiting unparalleled magnanimity, it criminally punished no man for political offenses, and warmly welcomed all who proved their ovalty by obeying the laws and dealing satis with their neighbors. It has steadily decreased, with a firm h bd. he resultant disorders of a great war, and initiated a wise and humane poley toward the Indians. The Pacific ailroad and similar enterprises have been generally aided and successfully conducted, the public lands treely given to actual settlers, immigration protected and encouraged, and a full acknowledgment of the naturalized citizens' rights, secured from European Powers. A uniform national currency has been provided, repudiation frowned down, the national credit sustained under most extraordinary burdens, and tew bonds negotiated at lower rates .-The revenues have been carefully collected and honestly applied. Despite annual large reductions of the fates of taxation, the public debt has been reduced during General Grant's Presiden cyat the rate of one hundred millions a year. Great financial crisis have been avoided and peace and plenty prevail tureughout the land. Menacing foreign difficulties have been peacefully and henorably composed, and the honor and

6. We are opposed to further grants of the public lands to corporations and monopolies and demand that the vational domain be set apart for free homes for the people.
