
THE NORTH CAROLINA LEGIS- LATURE.
(Condensed from the News.)
SENATE.
FRIDAY, Jan'y 24, 1873.
Senate called to order at 11 o'clock, Lieutenant Governor in the chair.
Introduction of Bills.
By Mr. Flemming, a bill to amend an act incorporating the town of Catawba Vale, in Catawba county. Referred.
By Mr. Seymour, a bill to prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors to minors.— Referred.
By Mr. Troy, a bill concerning Jus- tices of the Peace in Cross Creek Town- ship, Cumberland county. Referred.
By Mr. Harris, a bill to re-enact sec- tion 563, chapter 7, laws of 1868-'69.
By Mr. Mabson, a bill to incorporate the Cape Fear Water Works Company. Referred.

Rules Suspended.
The resolutions of Mr. Morehead, of Guilford, in regard to the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford Railroad, the preamble of which states that suits are now pending in the Superior Court of New Hanover to foreclose the mortgage on said road, and requests the Governor to inform the General Assembly what is being done by him for the interests of the State in said road, was taken up, adopted and sent to the House.
On motion of Mr. Mabson, the bill to repeal the act incorporating the Cape Fear Building and Loan Association, was taken up and passed its several readings.
Special Order.
The consideration of the "Midland North Carolina Railroad Company" bill came up as the special order at 11 o'clock.
On motion of Mr. Avera the bill was considered by sections.
Pending the discussion on the sixth section of the bill, on motion of Mr. Mer- rimon, moved its further consideration till to-morrow at 12 o'clock.
Miscellaneous.
The President announced the name of Mr. Nicholson as the Senate branch of the committee of Inquiry concerning the Keeper of the Capitol.
On motion of Mr. Avera the "Amnes- ty and Pardon" bill was referred to the Judiciary committee. Adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
Pursuant to adjournment, Mr. Speaker Robinson called the House to order at 10 a. m.
Mr. Gray, a memorial from citizens of Dare county in reference to fees of pilots.
By Mr. Scott, a bill to make Trent river a lawful fence. Referred.
By Mr. Bennett, a bill to repeal sec- tion 2, chapter 4, Revised Code. Re- ferred.
By Mr. Watson, a bill to incorporate the Chapel Hill and Iron Mountain Railroad. Referred.
By Mr. Perry, of Bladen, a bill to pro- hibit the sale of liquor in French's Creek Township, Bladen county. Re- ferred.
By Mr. McLaurin, a bill to amend section 10, chapter 139, laws of 1870-'1. Referred.
By Mr. Gray, a bill to create a Board of Navigation for Ocracoke Bay and Hatteras Inlet. Referred.
By Mr. McLaurin, a bill to establish a House of Refuge and Correction in New Hanover county. Referred.
By Mr. Lutterloh, a bill to change the time of holding the Superior Court of Cumberland county. Referred.
On motion of Mr. Michael, the rules were suspended and the resolution ask- ing our Senators and Representatives in Congress to use their influence against the repeal of the bankrupt law was taken up and adopted.
On motion of Mr. Dula, the rules were suspended and the bill to change the time of holding courts in the 10th Ju- dicial District was taken up and passed its several readings.
On motion of Mr. Anderson, of Clay, the report of the committee on Privi- leges and Elections, unseating W. P. Mabson, the member from Edgecombe, was taken up. The weight of the testi- mony goes to show that the said Mabson was not a citizen of Edgecombe county 12 months preceding his election.
The testimony was, on motion of Mr. Heaton, read.
After reading the evidence Mabson took the floor and, in substance, said: I have only one or two remarks to make in reference to my claim to a seat on this floor. I have been a citizen of Edgecombe county since 1869, as my sworn statement to the committee will show. When I left that county, I left for temporary purposes, and when my engagement in other counties termi- nated, I returned to Tarboro and resumed my employment there. I only ask justice at the hands of this body, and if it is deemed proper to return me to my constituents, I accept the situa- tion.
Mr. Badger then argued as to the con- stitutional meaning of the word "resi- dent." He thought that within the meaning of the law Mabson had a residence in Edgecombe county twelve months preceding his election, &c.
Mr. Norment thought the weight of the evidence was in favor of the sitting member, and went on to analyze the testimony presented by the Committee on Privileges and Elections. He thought the fact of Mabson's having registered

and voted in Beaufort county, while claiming to be a citizen of Edgecombe, amounted to nothing more than a breach of the criminal law of the State.
Mr. Badger then read from the decision of Judge Gaston in the case of Roberts vs. Cannon, 3rd Dev. & Bat., 256
Mr. Fletcher, followed in favor of the claims of the incumbent.
A long argument followed, after which
The motion to adopt the report of the committee was then put to a vote and adopted—yeas 59, nays 49
Mr. Anderson, of Clay, moved that the House go into a committee of the Whole on the bill to amend the school law.
Consideration of the School bill was then resumed as the unfinished business of yesterday.
After a long debate the substitute of Mr. Brown, of Mecklenburg, for the proposed 25th section proposed by the committee for sections 25, 26 and 27 of the old bill was voted down.
After a long debate on other amend- ments, the matter under consideration was postponed for the introduction, by Mr. Goodwyn, of the following resolu- tion:
Resolved, That the Governor be in- formed that, by a vote of this House, W. P. Mabson has been declared not entitled to a seat in this body as a member, and that a vacancy therefore exists in the representation from Edgecombe county.
The resolution was adopted.
On motion the House then adjourned.
