THE NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE.
[Condensed from the News.]
SENATE.
FRIDAY, Jan'y 31, 1873.
The Senate was called to order at 11 o'clock, Lieutenant Governor Brogden in the chair.
Rules Suspended.
On motion of Mr. Ellis, of Columbus, the substitute offered by the committee on the Insane Asylum, being a resolution to raise a Joint Select Committee, with Dr. Eugene Grissom, to proceed to Charlotte and Wilmington and inquire the cost of buildings and grounds for branches of the Lunatic Asylum, was taken up.
Pending the discussion on the adoption of the resolution, the hour arrived for the special order.
At 12½ o'clock the bill to alter the Constitution of North Carolina was taken up as the special order.

Message Received
From his Excellency, the Governor, transmitting certain documents from the State of Virginia in regard to the action of the General Assembly of that State on Internal Improvements. The message with accompanying documents was referred to committee on Internal Improvements.
Introduction of Bills.
By Mr. Waring, a bill to incorporate the Great Western Air Line Railroad. Referred.
By Mr. Stafford, a bill to require voters to show the tax receipt of the Sheriff for their poll tax before voting. Referred.

Special Order.
The bill for improvement of agriculture in the State was next taken up. The bill provides for the appointment of two committees, whose duty it shall be to go into every county in the State to advise the people in regard to the improvement of agriculture, &c.
The bill in regard to Constitutional amendments came up as the special order for 12½ o'clock.
Mr. Morehead, of Guilford, moved that it be considered the sense of the Senate that the alterations proposed be acted upon separately, and that the bill be recommitted to same committee with instructions to report by bill or otherwise, in accordance therewith.
Mr. Todd moved it be referred to Judiciary committee to inquire into legality, &c.
Mr. Grandy favored the motion to commit to the Judiciary.
Mr. Todd withdrew his motion, and the vote occurred on the motion of Mr. Morehead, of Guilford, which was adopted.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
House called to order at the usual hour by Mr. Speaker Robinson.
Mr. Brown, of Mecklenburg, a memorial from the stockholders of the Atlantic, Tennessee and Ohio Railroad company, asking a change of charter.
By Mr. Craige, a resolution authorizing the Governor to pray an appeal from the decree of the United States Circuit Court in the case of Henry Clews and others, plaintiffs, against the Western North Carolina Railroad Company, defendants, and for this purpose requiring the Treasurer to give an appeal bond. Referred.
By Mr. Bennett, a bill to provide for the printing of Battle's Revision of the Public Statute Laws, &c. Referred.
By Mr. Whitmore, a bill to prevent the felling of trees in the French Broad river. Referred.
By Mr. Blythe, a bill in regard to the fees of officers in civil cases. Referred.
By Mr. Godfrey, a bill in regard to the keeping up of public highways, ferries, &c. Referred.

The bill to repeal chapter 199, laws of 1871-'72, the General Incorporation act, was taken up as the special order for this hour (11:30).
Mr. McGee thought that if the law ought not be repealed, it should be greatly modified. He moved to postpone until Thursday next.
After a considerable debate Mr. McGee's motion to postpone was adopted.
The Senate bill in regard to Amnesty was received and referred to the Judiciary Committee.
On motion of Mr. Brown, of Mecklenburg, the resolution in reference to the Branch Mint at Charlotte, was taken up and adopted.
On motion of Mr. Haynes, the bill relative to the Western Turnpike road was taken up and passed its several readings.
By Mr. Ellison, resolution expelling from the floor of the House, as a reporter, one Jacob DeWitter, col., for reflecting upon the colored members of the House.
On motion of Mr. Ellison, the rules were suspended and the resolution was taken up for consideration.
Mr. Jones, of Caldwell, was opposed to the resolution. He did not think the freedom of the press should be interfered with.
Mr. Gant did not think the House had anything to do with the matter. The whole matter originated in a street quarrel between DeWitter and a colored member of the House.
Messrs. Gorman, Dudley, Williamson, Ellison, and Abbott, favored the resolution.
After a lengthy discussion the previ-

ous question was called, and the resolution was adopted by a vote of yeas 61, nays 31.
Adjourned.
