**THE NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE.**  
(Condensed from the News.)

**SENATE.**  
SATURDAY, Feb'y 1, 1873.  
Senate called to order at 11 o'clock, Lieutenant Governor Brogden in the chair.

Mr Norwood, a bill to allow cumulative suffrage in the city of Raleigh in the election of Town Commissioners.—Referred.

Mr J W Ellis, a bill requiring that all persons liable to pay a poll tax shall be required to exhibit a tax receipt before being allowed to vote. Inflicting a penalty for such offence. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

Mr Love a resolution in regard to the sale of books by the Secretary of State, authorizing the same to sell various public documents and laws now in his hands. Under a suspension of the rules it was adopted.

Mr Cowles called up the bill extending the time for taking out land grants. Allowed two years more time. Passed second and third readings.

Mr Troy, under suspension of the rules, called up resolution in favor of J McQueen, of Robeson county; that the Treasurer be authorized to pay him the reward offered by the State for the killing of Boss Strong.

The resolution passed its several readings.

Mr Norwood introduced a memorial from the Wilmington Commercial Bank concerning claims against the State.—Referred.

Mr Jas T Morehead, a bill to amend chapter 283 laws of 1868-'69.

The Special Order, being the consideration of the Midland North Carolina Railway, which is proposed to run from Beaufort to Memphis, was called up.

Mr Troy offered an amendment providing that this act shall not allow the corporation to interfere, in its exclusive right for fifty years, with any authority already vested in a corporated railroad company. Adopted.

Various amendments were offered looking to the location of the road upon some definite line, creating much discussion, but could not be made intelligible without publishing the bill.

Pending the discussion of the bill, the Senate adjourned, the matter being made the special order on Monday at 12 o'clock.

**HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.**  
House called to order at the usual hour by Mr Speaker Robinson.

By Mr Brown, of Davidson, a resolution abolishing the office of State Geologist. Referred.

By Mr Waugh, a resolution of instruction to the committee on Salaries and Fees to report a bill to reduce the salaries of Superior Court Judges. Calendar.

By Mr Presson, a resolution in favor of the Sheriff of Union county. Referred.

The bill to incorporate the Bell Cove Oyster Company was taken up, and passed its several readings.

The bill to incorporate the Stanley Creek Camp Ground was taken up, and passed its several readings.

The bill in reference to printing and distributing the public documents, was taken up and passed its several readings.

The bill to suspend the writ of mandamus in Davidson county so far as it relates to the Commissioners of that county, was taken up and, on motion of Mr Joyner, laid on the table.

The bill to amend the charter of the city of Raleigh was taken up and passed its several readings.

The House concurred in the Senate amendments to House bill in regard to vacant lands, allowing enterers until July 1st, 1873, to obtain grants.
