SENATE. THURSDAY, Feb. 6, 1878. The Senate was called to order at 101 o'clock, Mr Allen in the chair.

Messages Received

From His Excellency, the Governor, transmitting a copy of the report of the Commissioner of the Board of Public Charities. In his message the Governor says: "I have the honor to transmit herewith for your consideration, an Merchandise bought and sold in this claborate report of the Board of Public Charities, which I have read with a great deal of interest it would afford me pleasure to make some suggestions, stating wherein I do not concur with the recommendations of the Board; but fearing that it may be charged, as it was charged by members of your honorable body on a former occasion, when I endeavored to make, what appeared to me, legitimate suggestions with regard to our public debt, that I manifested a desire to usurp legislative functions and interfere with your prerogatives, I forbear now to say or do anything on the subject matter of the accompanying report, further than

to transmit the report itself." The report was ordered to be printed, and after some discussion as to what disposition should be made of the Gov-

ernor's message, On motion of Mr Harriss, its further consideration was postponed until the first day of June.

Special Order.

At 111 o'clock the President announced the arrival of the special order, which was the consideration of the Constitutional Amendments.

Mr Cunningham at some length advocated the necessity and importance of passing the amendments proposed, referring to each of the proposed alter-

Previous question being called on the passage of the bill on its second reading, the vote resurred on the 1st amendment offered, which was to strike out the section in relation to the public debt. The yeas and nays being called the amendment passed by 34 to 7.

The second amendment, which provides for the abolition of the office of Superintendent of Public Works passed by 33 ayes to 8 nays. Mr Harris chang-

ing his vote to the negative.

The third amendment, which strikes from the Constitution the provision providing for the Code Commission passed by 33 yeas to 6 nays. Eppes not voting, and Harris voting for the amendment.

The fourth amendment, which allows tax exemptions to be applicable to any species of property to the amount named passed by 33 yeas to 7 nays. Eppes voting for the amendment.

The fifth amendment in relation to the State University, which takes the charge of the University from the Board of Education and transfers it to the General Assembly, failed by 30 yeas to 10 nays. Mr MoreLead, of Guilford, who had changed his vote from the affirmative to the negative before the vote was announced, moved a reconsideration, and on motion, the vote on the reconsideration postpored until 101

o'clock to-morrow. The sixth amendment in relation to Public Schools and Public Instruction failed by the same vote as above, with the exception, that Mr Troy changed his vote to the negative, and afterwards moved a reconsideration, the considera- 1873. 


