THE NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE.

SENATE.
SATURDAY, Feb'y 8, 1873.
The Senate was called to order at 10 o'clock, Lieutenant Governor Brogden in the chair.
The Journal of yesterday was read and approved.
On motion of Mr. Troy the vote by which the charter of the Bank of Fayetteville passed last night was reconsidered, and its consideration postponed till Friday next at 12 o'clock.
Calendar.
Resolution in relation to the \$25 tax required to be paid before the consideration of charters for corporations, etc., so defined as to exempt from its provisions, religious, educational or charitable corporations.
Bill in reference to Executors and Administrators in Northampton county passed its several readings.
Miscellaneous.
The President announced that he had received a communication from the Secretary and Treasurer of the State University, which was read and transmitted to the House.
A resolution was introduced by Mr. Waring, instructing the committee on Finance to prepare a bill in relation to the payment of poll tax. Referred.
The bill providing Cumulative Sut frage for the city of Raleigh, was made the special order for Friday next.
Bill to incorporate the Old North State Lumber, Mining and Manufacturing Company, passed its readings.
Bill to incorporate the Haw River and New Hope Transportation Company passed its reading.
The bill for the relief of John G. Williams was taken up.
The bill passed its third reading under a suspension of the rules.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
At 10 A. M. Mr. Speaker Robinson called the House to order.
By Mr. Waugh, a bill to appoint Commissioners to construct and finish a road across the Blue Ridge, in burry county. Referred.
By the same, a bill to amend paragraph 532 Code Civil Procedure. Referred.
The consideration of the bill to provide for the collection of taxes by the State and the several counties of the State on property, poll, &c., was resumed, and the bill passed its second reading.
The bill to change the time for holding the election for Mayor and Commissioners was taken up and, on motion of Mr. Standford, laid on the table.
The bill to incorporate the Cape Fear Water Works Company was taken up and passed its several readings.
The bill to repeal chapter 61, Private Laws of 1870-'71, was taken up and passed its several readings.
The bill to incorporate the Oxford Colored Educational Association was taken up and passed its several readings.
A message was received from the Senate acknowledging the reception of the message relative to the impeachment of R. M. Henry.
The bill to lay off and construct a public road across Grandmother Gap, was taken up and passed its several readings.
The bill to incorporate the Onslow county Agricultural Society was taken up and passed its several readings.
The bill to extend the limits of the town of Wadesboro', Anson county, was taken up and passed its several readings.
The bill to incorporate the Stowe Falls Manufacturing Company was taken up and passed its several readings.
The bill to incorporate the Cape Fear and Peoples' Steamboat Company was taken up and passed its several readings.
Mr. Bowman moved to reconsider the vote by which the House on yesterday adopted the resolution to impeach R. M. Henry. Solicitor of 12th Judicial District, and moved to make the motion special order for Monday at 11 o'clock A. M.
Mr. Anderson, of Clay, moved to lay Mr. Bowman's motion on the table. Adopted.
Adjourned.
