THE NORTH CAROLINA LEGIS. LATURE.

Condensed from the News.]

Monday, Feb'y 10, 1873. SENATE.

The Lieutenant Governor presiding. Messrs Love, Welch, and Morehead, of Rockingham, made reports from their re-pective committees.

By Mr Troy, a resolution relative to the Penitentiary, requesting the Public T easurer to communicate to the Senate whether or not he paid any money to G W. Welker, or any member of the Board of Directors appointed by the Mail Governor. It so to whom and at what time, etc. Adopted.

House resolutions asking our Repre- Express sentatives and Senators to secure the passage of a law praviding-pensions for soldiers in the war with Mexico, taken up and adapted.

Joint reso ution asking our Represen tatives and Senators in Congress to secure the passage of a law amendatory of the Internal Revenue law, was on Arrive at Petersburg motion of Mr Gudger, laid on the table.

House bill in relation to Clerks of the press trains Superior Courts, requiring them to open their offices every succeeding day after Monday if the business was not dispatched.

The hour of 11 having arrived, the consideration of the School bill was announced as the special order for this

Mr Cunningham, as Chairman of the Committee on Education, submitted some remarks in regard to the bill as a whole, but thought the sections should be considered seriatim. He said the committee had worked faithfully on the various amendments, and he hoped the bill would be adopted.

The entire session was occupied in the discussion of the amendments, sever 1 of which alterations were made.-Pending the consideration of the 29th e ction the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Mr Speaker Rubinson called the

House to order. Messrs Morrison, Brown, of Mecklenburg, and Gidney, submitted reports

from various standing committees. By Mr Norment, a bill to prevent the sale of liquor near certain churches in Robeson county. Referred.

By Mr Grang, a bill to incorporate the town of Averasboro. Referred. Mr Bennett was granted au indefinite leave of absence on account of illness.

By Mr Perfy, a bill to prevent the sale of liquor near Brown Marsh church, B'aden county.

On motion of Mr Gorman, the vote by which the resolution authorizing the sale of Durants Island was adopted was reconsidered.

Mr Guyther moved to indefinitely postpone the resolution. Adopted. By Mr Badger, a bill to secure a proper accountability by the officers of the State. Reterred.

On motion of Mr McGebee, the bil in relation to fences and the protection of crops was taken up.

Mr McGenee took the floor in advo cacy of the bill and in explanation of its provisions. Messrs Brown and Reid of Mecklen-

burg, spoke at length in favor of the bill. They believed its passage would enhance the value of real estate and greatly improve the stock of the country, &c.

Messrs Norment and McNeil did not wish such a law for their county. Mr Bowman, of Davidson, moved to

amend so that it may be discretionary with the Commissioner of counties as to submitting the question in their coun Mr Norment said that if that amend-

ment was adopted he would have no objection to the bill. The amendment was adopted.

Mr Badger was opposed to the bill in every shape or form. He moved to

indefinitely postpone. Messrs Morrison and Stanford did not wish the law for their counties, but were willing to allow those counties to have it that desired it.

Messrs Bowman, Ellison and Jordan argued in favor of the motion to indefi nitely postpone.

After a lengthy debate a vote was taken upon the motion of Mr Badger to indefinitely postpone, which was rejected - yeas 31, nays 37.

Another long debate ensued, which resulted in Mr Badger moving to lay on the table. The yeas and nays were called and the motion rejected by a vote of yeas 33, nays 52.

On motion of Mr Waugh, the bill was ecommitted to the committee on Agri-Mr Gorman, from the committee to

investigate the charges against the Keeper of the Capitol, P McGowan, of malfeasance in office, submitted a report. The report fully exonerates and acquits that officer of all the charges, and the committee sign the report unanimously, and further say that Mr McGowan is the best Keeper of the Capitol the State ever had.


The Senate bill to incorporate the Midland North Carolina Railway Company being the special order, its con-






