THE NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE.

(Condensed from the News.)
SENATE.
SATURDAY, Feb'y 15, 1873.
Introduction of Bills.
By Mr Allen, a bill to prevent the sale of spirituous liquors within the corporate limits of Kenansville, Duplin county.
By Mr Avera, a bill to lay off and establish a new county to be called Bragg.
By Mr Hill, a bill to incorporate Charlotte Baptist Church in Brunswick county.


Introduction of Resolutions.
By Mr Cowles, a resolution to print the muster rolls of the war of 1812.
By Mr Ellis, of Columbus, a resolution in favor of J H Hill.
By Mr Waring, a resolution of instruction to the Attorney General.
The resolution reads as follows:
WHEREAS, It appearing from the statement of D W Bain, Chief Clerk of the Treasury Department, made before the Special Committee to investigate the management of the Penitentiary, that Geo W Welker, President of the Board of Directors of the Penitentiary, appointed by Gov Tod R Caldwell, and upon a warrant signed by the said Tod R Caldwell, Governor, did draw from the State Treasury the sum of \$5,000; and whereas, it further appears from said statement that the said sum of \$5,000 has neither been returned to the Treasurer nor accounted for; therefore

Resolved by the Senate, the House concurring, That the Attorney General of the State be instructed and required, in the name of the State, to institute suit against the said George W Welker, and his official bond, for the recovery of the sum, with all the legal interest accrued thereon.
By Mr Powell, a resolution for the relief of the Lunatic Asylum. Provides that \$45,000 be appropriated for the current expenses of the Asylum for the coming fiscal year, to be paid quarterly. Adopted and sent to the House.
Special Order.
The bill to incorporate the Farmer's Bank of Fayetteville was taken up and discussed at considerable length. Several amendments were proposed in regard to the rate of interest to be charged by the Bank, &c.
The bill finally passed with the amendment restricting its rate of interest to laws to be hereafter passed by the General Assembly.

Calendar.
House bill authorizing the levying of a special tax in the County of Bladen.
The committee recommended that the Constitutional equation be observed.—Amendment adopted. The bill not to be submitted to the voters of the county.
Bill passed its second reading.
Bill incorporating the Mechanics' Hose Company at Wilmington. Passed its several readings.
House bill allowing the Commissioners of Columbus county to levy a special tax. Passed its third reading.

Messages Received.
From the House transmitting several bills; among the number, the resolution of Mr Fleming in regard to authorizing the Governor to take appeal in regard to the sale of the Western N. C. R. R., with an amendment which was concurred in.
HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
SATURDAY, Feb. 15, 1873.
Mr Norment, a memorial asking a prohibitory law for Lumberton, Robeson county.
By Mr Outlaw a bill to incorporate the town of Duplin, Duplin county. Referred.
By Mr Robinson, a bill to make entry takers ex-officio county agents. Referred.
By Mr Maxwell, a bill concerning inspectors in the city of Wilmington. Referred.
On motion of Mr McGehee, the Senate bill to amend the Constitution of the State so as to make the sessions of the General Assembly biennial instead of annual, was taken up and passed its first reading by the requisite two-thirds vote—yeas 80, nays 6.
On motion of Mr Craig the resolution authorizing an appeal in the case of Henry Clews vs. the Western North Carolina Railroad, was taken up.
Mr Johnston offered a resolution providing for the levy of a tax of 25 cents on the \$100 to relieve the Road from its embarrassments, which was voted down.
After some further debate the resolution passed its third reading.

Revenue Bill.
The bill entitled an act to raise revenue was taken up and considered by sections. [The amendments offered were so numerous and the debate thereon so general and long, that the space necessary to give each gentleman a correct and impartial report, cannot be given. In accordance with the usual custom we suppose the advertisement of the bill, when perfected, will be ordered in the newspapers in the various sections of the State.
The bill passed its second reading, yeas 61, nays 23.
On motion of Mr Guyther, the bill to secure advances made for agricultural purposes was taken up and passed its several readings.

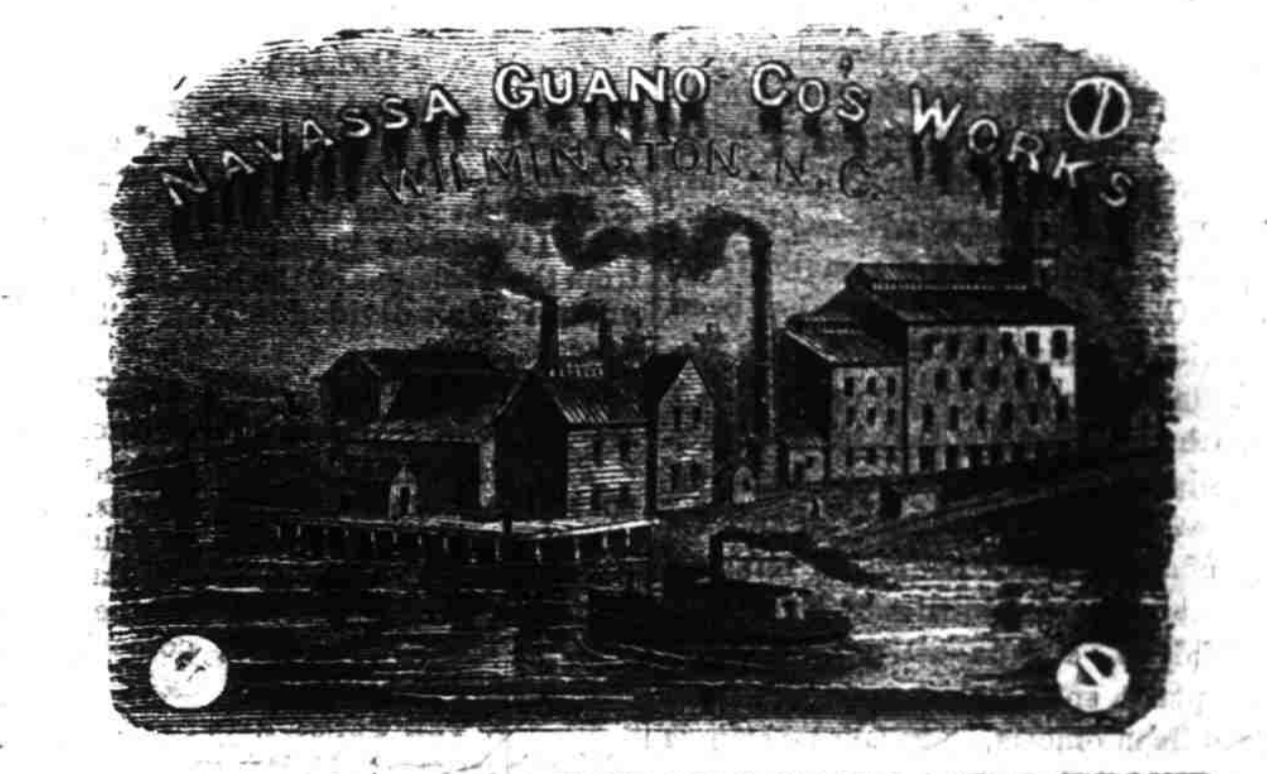
