THE NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE.

[Condensed from the News.]

SENATE.

WEDNESDAY, Feb'y 19, 1873.

Senate called to order at 10 o'clock, Lieutenant Governor in the chair.

Mr. Ellis, of Columbus, introduced a petition from citizens of Columbus county, praying an act to prevent the sale of ardent spirits within one mile of Peacock's Store, in said county.

Mr. Dunham, from special committee, on the calendar and adjournment, reported that having examined the calendar of the two Houses, they thought the Legislature might adjourn at 12 o'clock on Monday, the 3rd of March, providing night sessions be held up to that time, and offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the General Assembly adjourn on Monday, the 3rd of March, at 12 o'clock M., to re-assemble on the third Monday in November next.

Adopted.
Mr. Guder, of Catawba, introduced a bill to incorporate the North Carolina Classes of the Reformed Church of the United States.

Mr. Guder, a bill to incorporate the John's River Bridge Company.
On motion of Mr. Cunningham, the bill, with the amendments from the committee, authorizing cities and towns of 2,000 inhabitants to establish and maintain public schools, was ordered to be printed.

The bill providing for the election of the officers of the General Assembly, and defining the duties of the same, was placed upon its third reading, and, after various amendments were adopted, the bill was tabled.

Mr. Walker offered a petition from the citizens of Rutherford in relation to the Hickory Nut Turnpike Company. Filed with the bill concerning the same.

Mr. Flemming called up bill in favor of the Marion and Asheville Turnpike. Made the special order for 11 o'clock to-morrow.

Mr. Powell, under a suspension of the rules, called up bill ordering the printing of the muster roll of 1812. Three hundred copies to be printed and distributed. Adopted.

Mr. Harris called up bill allowing persons who may have erected buildings upon public grounds, without injury thereto, to remove the same. Adopted.

Bill relating to the improvement and promotion of the agriculture of the State was considered.

Mr. Norwood offered a substitute therefor to the effect that the State Geologist shall devote so much of his time as he can to the mode or system of agricultural cultivation now in use in the State, and that the Superintendent of Public Instruction be instructed to cause the simple elements of agriculture to be taught in all the public schools of the State.

The substitute was referred to committee on Immigration, who have in preparation a bill covering the grounds therein stated.

The bill chartering the Great Western Air Line Railway company came up as special order, to be run from some point near Weldon on the Virginia line to Charlotte, with a capital stock of \$5,000,000. Passed second reading.

Mr. Epps introduced a bill to amend the charter of the Scotland Neck and Halifax Railroad company. Referred.

Mr. Murphy, a bill for the benefit of the North Carolina Deaf and Dumb Asylum. Referred.

Bill to amend an act referring to administrators and executors, section 66, chapter 113, laws of 1868 and '69.—Passed third reading.

Bill revising the act incorporating the Bank of Raleigh—re-enacting the same. Failed to pass its third reading.

On motion of Mr. Flemming, the vote was reconsidered, and the farther consideration of the question postponed until 9 o'clock to-night.

The "Machinery Bill" was made special order for 11 o'clock to-morrow and the same every morning until the bill shall have been disposed of.

The question to reconsider the vote, by which the Constitutional Amendment regarding the Judiciary was lost, was made the special order for Friday at 12 o'clock.

Mr. Dunham moved that 250 additional copies of the report of the committee on Public Charities be printed for distribution. Adopted.

Adjourned.

NIGHT SESSION.

Senate met at 7 o'clock, Lieut. Governor in the Chair.
The bill giving cumulative suffrage to the city of Raleigh in the election of Commissioners was considered. The committee on Propositions and Grievances reported favorably upon the bill.

Mr. Hill, from same committee, submitted a minority report adverse to the measure, believing that the majority of the voting population of the city did not wish such a change.

The bill passed its second reading by a vote of yeas 23, nays 11.
Adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

House called to order at 10 o'clock by Speaker Robinson.
By Mr. Trivett, a bill to provide adequate clerical force in the office of the Secretary of State and that of the Auditor. Referred.

By Mr. Beckett, a bill in reference to the Western railroad. Referred.
By the same, a bill to amend chapter 113, laws of 1869 and '70. Referred.

By Mr. Richardson, a bill to repeal that portion of charters of corporations which exempts them from taxation.—Referred.

By Mr. Brown, of Mecklenburg, a bill to provide for the enforcement of judgments obtained upon obligations contracted for the purchase of real estate when title has passed. Referred.

Mr. Badger, from the Joint select committee to examine the Calendar and report a day for adjournment, stated that it would be impossible for the General Assembly to adjourn before the 3d of next month, and in order to do that, both Houses would have to hold night sessions and work hard.

After considerable labor on the machinery bill, the House adjourned.

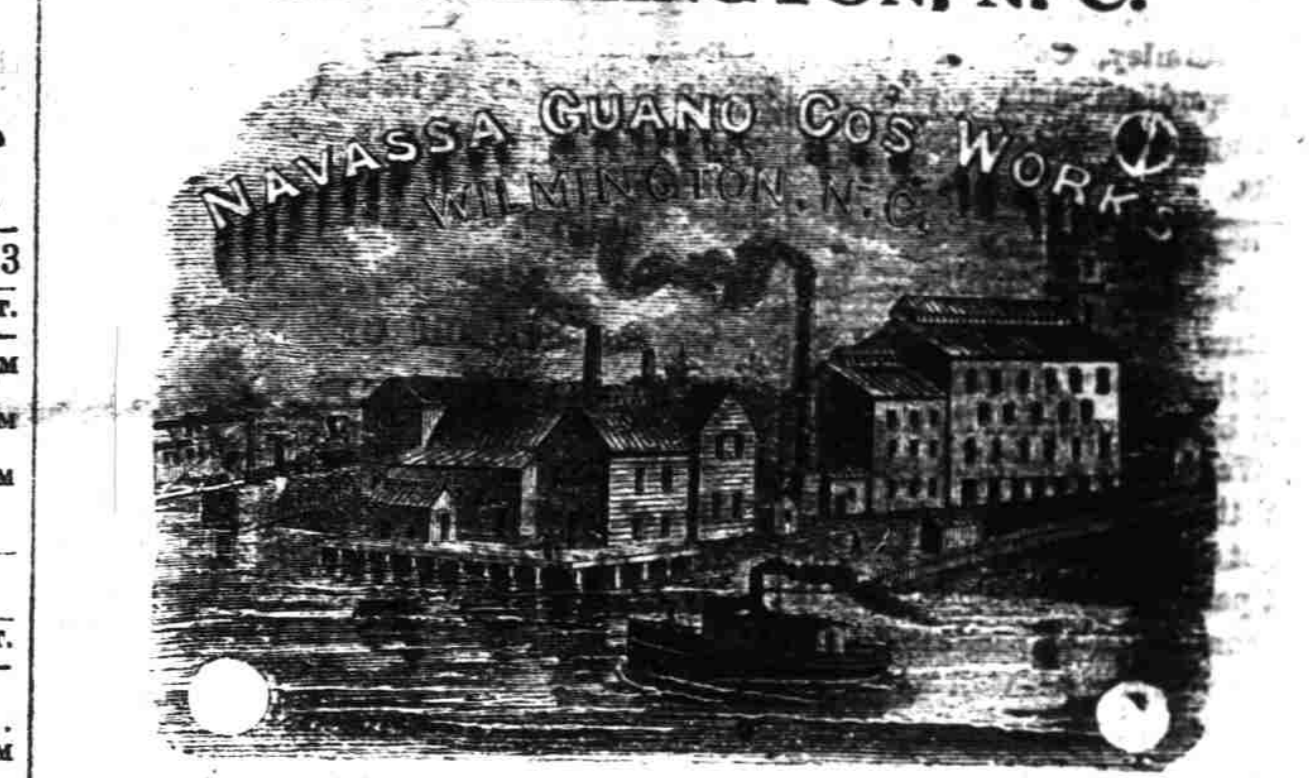
