THE NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE.

(Condensed from the News)

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
NIGHT SESSION.
WEDNESDAY, Feb'y 19th, 1873.
According to adjournment, Mr Speaker Robinson called the House to order at 7:30 o'clock.
The bill to incorporate the Weldon and Garysburg Road and Ferry Company was taken up and passed its several readings.
The bill to incorporate the Wilmington Ship Canal passed its several readings.

The bill to incorporate the Lonefield High School, Duplin county, passed its several readings.
Senate bill to incorporate the Old North State Lumber, Mining and Manufacturing Company, passed its several readings.
Senate bill to incorporate Square Stone Lodge, F. and A. M., Warrenton, passed its several readings.
Bill giving the Supreme Court power to grant writs of certiorari in certain cases passed its several readings.
Bill to cure defects in certain judicial proceedings arising from mistakes in jurisdiction, passed its several readings.
Bill to provide for the enforcement of decrees in suits in equity rendered prior to a certain act of 1868, passed its second reading.

The bill to incorporate the town of Duplin Road, Duplin county, passed its several readings.
The bill to incorporate the town of Fair Bluff, Columbus county, passed its several readings.
Bill to allow a special tax in Brunswick county passed its second reading, yeas 101, nays 3.
The bill to change the time of holding Superior Courts in Cumberland county passed its second readings.

SENATE.
THURSDAY, Feb'y 20, 1873.
Senate met at 10 o'clock, Lieutenant Governor in the chair.
Mr Norwood presented the following communication, which was read:
RALEIGH, N. C., Feb 19, 1873.

Mr. J. W. NORWOOD,
Dear Sir: We think it of more importance to the party to deal fairly and honestly with Mr Turner about the public printing than to pass the Amnesty Bill, and we are determined to vote against the bill unless the party will agree to give both Editors a fair chance for it. There are enough of us—and we are determined to defeat the bill unless we get fair dealing in this matter.

Mr Norwood moved that the same be transmitted to the House. Adopted.
On motion of Mr Welch, the bill relating to the public debt was made special order for Monday next at 11 o'clock.
Mr Nicholson introduced a bill regulating the sale of land sold under executions. Referred.

Mr Love, a bill to amend the charter of the Western Division of the W. N. C. Railroad. Referred.
The "Machinery Bill" was considered by sections. This bill provides for the collection of taxes by the State and the several counties of the State on property, polls and income, and the manner in which the same shall be done. After various amendments (which would not be understood unless the whole bill be published,) the bill passed its several readings.
Mr Waring introduced a resolution raising a joint select committee to negotiate with the Messrs. Coleman for a surrender of their contract for the erection of the Penitentiary building, said committee to report at an early day.
Mr Worth offered an amendment instructing the said committee report what tax will be necessary to provide for the support of this institution during the present year.
The resolution of Mr Waring to raise the committee was adopted.
Mr Waring moved a reconsideration of the vote, and that the said motion be laid upon the table. Adopted.

At Journal.
NIGHT SESSION.
Lieutenant Governor called the Senate to order at 7 1/2 o'clock.
On motion of Mr Allen, the bill relating to public charities was made special order for to-morrow at 11 o'clock.
Bill allowing cumulative suffrage in the election of Commissioners for the city of Raleigh was taken up on its third reading.
An amendment was offered extending the privilege to all incorporated towns in the State. Lost.
The bill passed by a vote of 22 yeas to 11 nays.

Mr Norwood moved to reconsider the vote by which this bill passed, and to lay this motion on the table. Adopted.
Bill revising an act incorporating the Bank of the City of Raleigh was considered.
Bill passed third reading.
Resolution in relation to the public library—empowers the Joint committee on public library to employ some one to take charge of the same for the space of two years. Adopted.
Mr Ellis, of Columbus, called up bill changing the dividing line between Bladen and Columbus. Passed its several readings.
