THE NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE.

[Condensed from the News.]
HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
NIGHT SESSION.
FRIDAY, Feb'y 21st, 1873.

At 7:30 Mr Speaker Robinson called the House to order.
Mr Badger introduced a bill to protect the youth of the State in regard to impure liquor. Calendar.

Unfinished Business.
Senate bill to alter the Constitution in relation to public charities was postponed until tomorrow at 12 M.

On motion of Mr Whinnant, the rules were suspended and House bill to amend chapter 241, laws 1870-71, was taken up and passed its several readings.

House bill to establish fees of Treasurer of Rutherford county, passed second reading.

House resolution instructing the Judiciary Committee to examine into the propriety of amending the present fee bill, so as to increase the fees of Clerks and other officers, was read.

Mr Bowman moved to lay the resolution on the table. Lost.
Mr Morrison moved to indefinitely postpone.

The motion to indefinitely postpone prevailed, yeas 62.

House bill to require the Auditor of State to give bond in the sum of \$50,000, was postponed until Monday at 12 M.

House bill to amend section 84, chap. 113, laws of 1868-69, passed its several readings.

House bill concerning corporations passed its several readings.

House bill to provide for amendments in Justices' Courts, passed its several readings.

House bill to amend section 3, chapter 139, laws of 1870-71, passed its several readings.

House bill to amend section 504, Code of Civil Procedure, passed its several readings.

House bill to amend sections 496 and 497, Code of Civil Procedure, passed its several readings.

House bill concerning Superior Courts passed its several readings.

House bill to allow Constables same fees as are now allowed Sheriffs, passed its several readings.

House bill to amend section 37, chap. 116, laws of 1868-69, was postponed until tomorrow at 11 A. M.

Adjourned.

SENATE.
SATURDAY, Feb'y 22, 1873.

Senate called to order at 10 o'clock by Lieut Gov Brogden.

Calendar.
The bill to charter the Old North State Life Insurance Company of Warren, with an amendment by the committee on Insurance, restricting the rate of interest of said Company to 8 per cent., passed its several readings.

Bill for the relief of the Commercial Bank of Wilmington was taken up. The provisions of the bill are to this effect, that \$74,000 bearing date the 20th November, 1862, held by the Commercial Bank of Wilmington, purporting to have been issued in Feb. 1861, be endorsed by the Public Treasurer.

A lengthy discussion arose on this bill, Messrs Norwood, Mabson and Cunningham and Respass opposing.

Mr Cunningham said the passage of the bill would inevitably lead to dangerous consequences, as the door would be opened to thousands of other cases that he knew of.

The bill failed on its second reading. The resolution in regard to relieving the disabilities of W W Holden was next taken up.

Mr Harris opened the discussion which became general, first on the motion to refer to the Judiciary committee, and on the motion to refer to the Supreme Court for information as to whether or not the General Assembly had the power to take action in the matter.

During the discussion, Mr Respass said in substance, that the Democratic side of the House should show that magnanimity that had characterized their actions in the passage of the Amnesty and Pardon bill, and vote accordingly for this resolution.

Mr Welch said that this lecture from the Senator from Beaufort came with bad grace from that side of the House; that he thought that Governor Holden was a member of the League and pardoned by the Amnesty bill, as his offences were committed by order of some member or officer of the League, as sworn to by a prominent Republican.

Mr Harris replied that the witness referred to by the Senator from Haywood was Mr Badger, and that he (Harris) was present at the meeting referred to, and such advice was given to Governor Holden by Senator Pool.

On motion of Mr Worth to table the resolution, Mr Mabson called the yeas and nays, and the motion was lost by 15 yeas to 20 nays.
The vote then recurred on the reference of the resolution to the Judiciary committee, and pending the discussion on this matter, Mr Avera called the previous question on the passage of the resolution.
Mr Welch demanded the yeas and nays.
The resolution was lost by the following vote:
Yeas—Messrs Chamberlain, Harris,

Hill, Holloman, Horton, Hyman, Long, Mabson, McCabe, McCotter, Miller, Powell, Respass and Walker—14.
Nays—Messrs Allen, Avera, Cowles, Cunningham, Davis, Ellis, of Catawba, Ellis of Columbus, Fleming, Gidger, Love, McCauley, Morehead, of Guilford, Morehead, of Rockingham, Murphy, Nicholson, Norwood, Prior, Scott, Stafford, Todd, Welch and Worth—22.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
At 10 A. M. Mr Speaker Robinson called the House to order.

By Mr Gidger, a resolution to provide for a casual deficit in the Treasury.—Referred. The Senate amendments to the "Machinery bill" were taken up and agreed to.

The bill to amend section 37, chapter 116, laws of 1868-69 was taken up and passed its several readings.

On motion of Mr Gorman, the resolution in reference to the portrait of Washington was taken up, and on motion of Mr Gidger, was indefinitely postponed.

On motion of Mr Waddell, the vote by which the bill to amend section 504, C C P passed its third reading last evening, was reconsidered. The question recurred upon the passage of the bill on its third reading, and the bill failed to pass.

On motion of Mr Marler, the resolution in reference to the birth-day of Washington was taken up.

The resolution was adopted.

The bill to allow a special tax in Anson county was taken up and passed its third reading, yeas 96, nays 00.

The Senate bill to alter the Constitution of the State in regard to Public Charities was taken up as the special order.

After debate, a vote was taken and the bill failed on its third reading, yeas 68, nays 35. [Not two thirds.]

Mr Wiley moved to suspend the rules and take up the other amendments.—[The same as those passed by the last Legislature and rejected by the Senate at this session.]

The bill to alter the Constitution in regard to the supreme Court, having three judges instead of five as at present, was taken up.

Mr Bowe moved to indefinitely postpone.

The yeas and nays were called and the motion failed, yeas 43, nays 64. (A strict party vote with the exception of Mr Trivet.)

The bill then failed to pass its first reading by the following ballot: yeas 62, nays 40.

The bill to alter the Constitution in regard to the term of office of the Governor. (Making the term two years instead of four) was taken up.

A ballot was taken and the bill failed by a vote of yeas 60, nays 44.
Adjourned.
