## THE NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE.

(Condensed from the News.)

### SENATE.

MONDAY, Feb'y 24, 1873

The Senate met at 10 o'clock, Lieut. Governor in the chair.

The rules were suspended, and the following bills passed their several readings.

Bill relating to the People's Agricultural Society, composed of the counties of Catawbs, Burke, Caldwell and Alexander.

Bill allowing any five County Commissioners to declare streams lawful fences, under certain circumstances.

Bill to prevent the obstruction of natural water courses by the felling of trees or otherwise.

The special order being the consideration of the bill, introduced by Mr. Welch, clarifying what portion of the debt of North Carolina is valid, and to pay off the same, &c.

Mr. Cunningham moved to refer the bill to the Committee on Public Debt. Adopted.

Bill extending the time of registering the grants of lands, deeds, and other conveyances. Passed its several readings.

Bill to regulate the time for the election of Justices of the Peace and that of Township officers—that the same take place at the same time with the election of members of the Legislature, and the present officials hold over until the Fall of 1874. Passed its second reading and referred to Judiciary Committee.

Bill amending an act providing for the service of process issuing from Justices of the Peace in civil causes, when one or more of the defendants may reside out of the county in which the action is brought. Passed its several readings.

### HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

House called to order at 10 o'clock by Speaker Robinson.

By Mr. Bennett, a bill to amend the act incorporating the Wilmington Real Estate Loan Association. Referred.

The bill to repeal the act to incorporate the Cape Fear Building Association was taken up and on motion of Mr. Badger, was passed over.

On motion of Mr. Richardson, the Senate bill to change the line between the counties of Bladen and Columbus was taken up and passed its several readings.

The bill requiring the State Auditor to give bond in the sum of \$20,000 was taken up and passed its several readings.

On motion of Mr. Brown, of Mecklenburg, the bill to alter the Constitution in regard to the judicial power was taken up and failed to pass its first reading, yeas 58, nays 45.

The bill to alter the Constitution in regard to the abolition of County Commissioners was taken up and failed to pass its first reading, yeas 79, nays 46.

The bill to alter the Constitution in reference to the abolition of townships was taken up and failed, yeas 60, nays 42.

The bill to alter the Constitution in regard to paying members of the Legislature \$300 was taken up and failed to pass its first reading.

The bill to alter the Constitution relative to public schools and public institutions, failed to pass its first reading—yeas 60, nays 43.

The bill to alter the Constitution relative to the judiciary and the judicial districts, failed to pass its first reading—yeas 69, nays 41.

Mr. Craig was announced as being detained from his seat by sickness. The same announcement was made in regard to Messrs. Heaton and Watson. Adjourned.

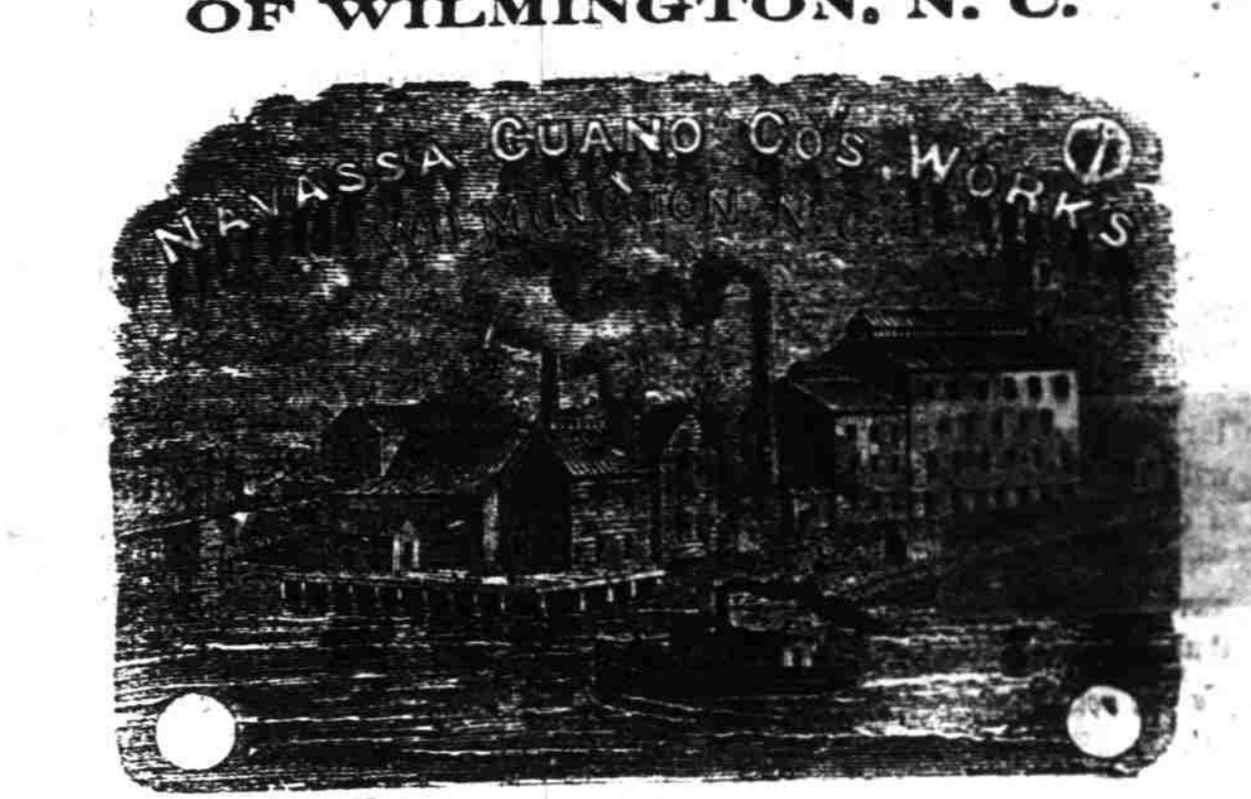
