

The case of Fusier, the "car book murderer," has attracted the attention of the reading people all over this country, and as to-day is the day fixed for his execution, a slight reference to it may not be out of place. The most extraordinary exertions have been made in his behalf, and everything that tamily influence, the clergy, or money cou d accomplish, has been tried, but without avai'. Even the widow of the murdered Putsam petitioned Gov. Dix to commute his sentence to imprisonment for life, but it was unsuccess'n'. The Rev. Dr. Tyng mide a most urgent appeal. which called forth a long letter from the Governor, declining to interfere to the matter. In this letter be gives brief resume of the case, which will refresh the memories of our readers.

"Foster and Putnam, his victim, m t in a railroad car in the city of Now York. The latter had two ladies in his tharge, and, in consequence of certain annoyances by the former, remonstrated with him on his conduct. It does not appear that Purnam offered him any prov cation. Fuster, who had been o the front platform, entered the car and sat down by Putnam, asking him seve ral times how far he was going; and when the latter d clined to answer and turned away, obviously desiring to avoid a controversy. Foster said, ' Well I am going as far as going go, and before you leave this car I will give you helt !

" He then returned to the front pfare form and asked the driver if he had : car book, saying 'he would learn bin-(meaning Putnam) his business when he gets off the ear; he would learn him to keep his place.' The murder was committed on the 36th of April, 1871, and be was arrested the next morning, tried and found guilty on the 25 h of May following and sentenced to be hung on the 14 h of July. Early in July application was made for a commutation of the sen tence, and on the 6th a writ of error was filed and a stay of proceedings granted. Ou the 21st of February 1872, the judgment was affirmed at th General Term in the city of New York, and the 23 to: Match was fixed for the execution of the sentence. On the 11 h ot March a writ of error to the Court of Appeals with a stay of proceedings was granted, and on the 21st of Jinuary 1878, the judgment was affirmed by the last named tri unal,
