



The City Election.

Owing to a dispute over the returns from the First Ward, the ballots were all re-counted yesterday, as noticed in the Post. According to the last count a great change is made in the results as previously announced. By it Mr. I. B. Grainger is thrown out and Mr. Fishplate put in, as is also Mr. Wilson. The following are the candidates elected under the latter report: W. P. Canada, L. E. Rice, James Wilson, Henry Brewington, Hiram Hankins, Wm. H. Banks, Jacob Wise, Roger Moore, Alrich Adrian and S. H. Fishplate. The latter three are Democrats. Whether this present phase of the situation is a finality, of course we cannot say, but we hope the Board will go to work as speedily as possible in the interests of the city. We promise them the hearty co-operation of the Post in every move looking toward the prosperity of the city and its inhabitants. There are men of ability on this new Board, who should be of great benefit to the people, and we hope to see an unprecedented year of prosperity under their administration.

EDITORIAL BUDGET.

The Presbytery of New York are engaged in the discussion of a project of a Ministerial Life Insurance Company on the plan of the Mutual Aid Association.

The sale of stocks hypothecated by Taintor, cashier of the Atlantic National Bank, was forbidden, and the transfer stopped. The stocks are the property of Samuel E. Williamson, trustee.

It is said one of the counsel of Stokes is the authority for the report that the decision of the Supreme Court on the motion for a new trial was adverse to Stokes. It is true, the case will be carried to the Court of Appeals.

The forty-ninth annual meeting of the Seamen's Friend Society shows 144 libraries were sent to sea the past year, making a total since the work was inaugurated of 4,385 libraries, or 195,000 volumes. The expenditures of the past year were \$61,427.

Various reports continue relative to the Pacific Mail Company, and the payment of the \$100,000 note by President Stockwell. Nothing is really known by the public about it. The stock has declined and advanced several times, the last quotation being 52.

The detective police arrested A. D. Reiman, an insurance agent, on the charge of having blackmailed Charles Frank. The accused threatened to give information that Frank's wife poisoned her former husband, but was willing to compromise matters for thirty thousand dollars. He finally agreed to settle the matter for five thousand dollars. The police put up a decoy parcel of money and gave Reiman a check for four thousand dollars. He was secured while presenting the check and taken to headquarters. All this happened in New York.

A lava bed special of the 3d says: "Fears are entertained of a rising among the Klamath Indians now on a reservation. General Davis and staff have arrived, but nothing will be done before the 20th, awaiting the arrival of the 4th infantry from Little Rock, Ark., and the full troops of the 1st cavalry from Arizona. The wounded are all doing well." A letter from the lava bed camp, written the day after Canby's massacre, confirms the previous statements that Riddle's squaw begged General Canby not to meet Captain Jack, as treachery was intended.

A Herald lava bed special of the 1st instant says nothing will be done at present. The troops are awaiting the arrival of the 4th infantry, 500 strong, from Little Rock, who are expected about the 17th inst. The correspondent attributes the great loss of life in the fight of the 25th to the desertion of company E, 12th infantry, and some few of the artillery, who, when ordered by Capt. Thomas to fall back and hold a bluff in the rear of the troops, to cover their retreat, continued to fall back until they reached camp. The Modocs meantime secured the position they were expected to hold. It is said only twenty three Modocs were engaged, and that only two were killed and two badly wounded.

WASHINGTON NOTES.

The Secretary of the Navy will issue proposals in a week or so for furnishing the different navy yards with copper and other metal.

The proposals for the new sloops of war, have at last been arranged so as to comply with the requirements of the law, and their issue can be looked for this week.

Second Assistant Engineer H. C. Henshaw, of the revenue marine service, is transferred from the revenue steamer Hamilton, at Boston, to the Fessenden at Detroit, Mich.

The receipts of internal revenue for Monday amounted to \$1,270,000. It is estimated now that these receipts for the remainder of the month will average a half a million dollars per day.

Senator Sumner's back pay has been received by Treasurer Spinner. Twenty-seven Senators and Representatives have thus far turned their back pay into the Treasury, amounting in all to \$111,322 97.

The postal treaty between Belgium and the United States is all perfected, and will be signed by the President upon his return, after the Belgian Minister and the Postmaster General affix their names to the document.

The Department of State has received information of the removal of O'Kelley to Havana, that his case is deemed less serious than was anticipated, and that all proper facilities will be extended to him.

The first tax to be assessed under the new internal revenue law requiring assessments to be made by the Bureau here will be the deficiency tax upon distillers who have not worked their distilleries up to within eighty per cent. of their working capacity. This tax will be collected during the present month.

A package of circulars, the circulars having an address thereon, may be mailed to one address at the rate of one cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof, to be prepaid by postage stamps; but when directed to a postmaster for distribution through the boxes in his office said postmaster should be furnished with postage to prepay a drop rate on each circular.

A new division will be created in the Internal Revenue Bureau called the "Assessment Division." The duties of the division will be those heretofore performed by internal revenue assessors under the old law. Collectors are to forward to this division all the facts for assessing special taxes, and an order issued to the respective collectors throughout the country to collect the same.

The programme for the completion of the south end of the new State Department building, should a fair share of good weather favor, is that the second story will be completed by the 1st of July, the third story by September, and that it will be put under roof by December next. On or before the 1st of June, 1874, it is believed it will be ready for occupancy. The fine large library of the State Department will occupy one of the rooms.

North Carolina Coast Survey. The following letter has been received at the Executive Office in relation to the survey of our coast:

U. S. COAST SURVEY OFFICE, Washington, April 30, 1873.

Hon. T. R. Caldwell, Gov. of North Carolina, Raleigh, N. C.:

SIR:—Upon examination of the statutes of North Carolina no law can be found for the protection of the officers who are now and have been for many years engaged in the survey of the coast and Sounds of your State. The assistants in the survey of the coast of the United States who are employed on this duty must necessarily have the right to enter upon private lands, erect signals and secure stations for future use, either for national or State purposes; and I would recommend to the Legislature of North Carolina the passage, at the earliest opportunity, of a law, similar to the laws of the other seaboard States for the protection of the signals and stations of the triangulation and of the officers engaged in its execution and in surveying, and for the assessment of damages in case of disagreement as to the extent of the injury which may be occasionally and unavoidably done to private property during progress of the work. (A copy of the law in reference to this matter passed by other States was enclosed in the communication, with the request that the Governor recommend its passage by our Legislature at its next session.)

Notice to Teachers.

THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS of New Hanover county will meet at the Court House in the city of Wilmington on the 2d day of June, 1873, for the purpose of examining Teachers and granting certificates to such applicants as may be found qualified. The examination will continue two days. All persons desiring to teach a Public School should be present for examination, as no Teacher can receive an order for wages for a School taught under the present law from the Public School funds on any certificate heretofore granted.

Teachers cannot draw any pay for teaching after this examination, without new certificates, and the standards are raised, and no certificates are to be granted but to those who have the requisite qualifications. The drill of two weeks, offered gratuitously to all Teachers, may enable many to secure their grade certificates who could not otherwise get them. All can do their work much better after this drill.

The Normal Drill will open in the Williston School House, Seventh street, on Monday, May 19th, 1873. Half fares, or return tickets on the Railroads, will be given, and some assistance in board. The sessions on Saturday of each week will be in the Hemlinway School House, near Boney Bridge, on Fourth Street, and will comprise a review of the work of the week. Another examination of Teachers may be expected in the Autumn.
